Machlin named to Hall of Fame

Jerry Machlin, the longtime ACBL tournament director, has been named the recipient of this year's Blackwood Award by the ACBL Hall of Fame Committee. The Blackwood Award is given to individuals who have contributed greatly to the game of bridge without necessarily being world-class players.

Machlin (1913-1997) was a resident of Silver Spring MD and began his directing career in the Forties at the encouragement of his uncle, the legendary tournament director Al Sobel, who is also a member of the Bridge Hall of Fame.

Machlin was treasurer and ACBL tournament

coordinator for the Mid-Atlantic (Districts 6 and 7) for many years.

He penned "The Poor Man's 30 (&60) Days" column in the Washington Bulletin, and wrote a book, *Tournament Bridge: An Uncensored Memoir*.



Just what the doctor ordered

Ross Weinstein played rubber bridge in college and medical school. With a family and a practice, he put bridge aside. When he was in his late fifties, however, he began having a series of mini-strokes that affected his day-to-day activities: he fell often and he had global amnesia, a type of memory loss.



While recovering, his memory therapist suggested that he take up bridge again. That was two years ago.

At first it was slow going for the Oakland MI resident.

The memory loss problem was devastating at bridge. Sometimes he couldn't remember what cards had been played. On bad days, he would forget the contract. It was more of a problem when he was tired.

"You don't know how many times I thought I was playing 3NT, but I was really in a part score," said Weinstein.

Weinstein thinks playing bridge has helped him with his memory problem. Along the way he learned coping skills. "Sometimes he talks to himself as he plays," said his partner Tom Hunt, of Rochester Hills MI. This seems to help.

"The opponents were tolerant and put up with my mumbling," said Weinstein. "I've always said that if they listened to what I was saying, they'd know how to defend against me."

Earlier this week, just two years after taking up duplicate bridge, Weinstein achieved Life Master status.

"Bridge fits my personality," said Weinstein. "I love the competition, and I have good card sense. There is always something new each time I play. I've now gotten to Flight B status as a player, while tracking with a Flight C brain."

Upsets abound in Vanderbilt Round of 32

The top seeds got little respect in Tuesday's Vanderbilt action, and several big-name squads got shown the door. Jimmy Cayne's No. 1 seed (Weed, npc) trailed their 32-seed opponents captained by Melih Ozdil for the first three quarters, but a last-quarter rally allowed Cayne to advance 158-139.

Nick Nickell's No. 2 squad was not so lucky, however, as Winthrop Allegeart's 31-seeded team beat them, 122-104. Allegeart played with Judith Bianco, Justin Lall, Kevin Bathurst, Jaggy Shivdasani and Lapt Chan.

Seeds 3 through 7 had comfortable wins, but

Steve Garner's #8 seed was taken out by Connie Goldberg's team, the original #40 seed, 157-141. Goldberg's lineup includes Bill Eisenberg, Henry Bethe, Allen Tan, Wafik Abdou and Nader Hanna.

Steve Robinson's squad (the #9 seed) also got the boot, as they lost to Barnet Shenkin's four-handed team (#24), 127-106. Shenkin played with David Bakshi, Bart Bramley and Nikolay Demirev.

#11 seed Reese Milner lost 148-114 to a very strong Polish team (#22) of Krzysztof Martens, Krzysztof Jassem, Boguslaw Gierulski and Jerzy Skrzypczak.

Greenberg, Hand dominate Mixed qualifying

Gail Greenberg and Jeffrey Hand had two monster sessions in yesterday's qualifying round of the Rockwell Mixed Pairs to lead the field by almost five boards. Not content with their 67.08% performance in the afternoon game, Greenberg and Hand turned in an eye-popping 76.69% score in the evening. Greenberg

lives in New York City. Hand is from Casselberry FL. Their two-session total is 935 (top = 25).

In second with 816 are Ken Cohen of Philadelphia and Janet Robertson of Timonium MD.

Of the 254 pairs who played in the qualifying round, 130 made the cut for today's final.

Swanson is Grand Life Master

John Swanson of Mission Viejo CA has advanced to Grand Life Master, a rank that requires a win in an unrestricted NABC event and more than 10,000 masterpoints.

Swanson was one of America's top players during the Sixties and Seventies in



partnership with Paul Soloway, Dick Walsh and other bridge greats. During a span of eight years, he won the Men's Pairs, the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams (two times), the Men's Teams, and the Grand National Teams (twice).

In world play, his team won the Bermuda Bowl Teams in 1977 and was second in 1975. He also represented the U.S. two other times (1971 and 1973), finishing fourth and sixth.

Swanson is author of the book *Inside the Bermuda Bowl* in which he recalls his experiences in world play. He is a WBF World Life Master.

E-ban takes effect at Summer NABC

Players are reminded that a new ban on electronic devices goes into effect for all nationally rated events at the 2008 Summer NABC. The new policy reads as follows:

Electronic devices, excluding health-related equipment, capable of sending or receiving communication, including but not limited to, headphones, earphones, cellular phones and mini-computers: (1) shall not be allowed in the playing areas, adjacent hallways, restrooms or accessible break areas; and (2) shall not be used during a session.

These restrictions shall apply to all pairs, team members, captains, coaches, recorders and kibitzers and shall apply throughout any actual playing session or segment.

A violation of this policy shall result in a disciplinary penalty of one full board (or 12 IMPs at that form of scoring) for the first offense. A second offense shall result in disqualification from the event for the pair/team.

Kibitzers violating this policy shall be removed from the playing area for the remainder of the session.

These devices are not permitted near the playing area, even if they are turned off.

JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

"And then I said. . ."

When you open the bidding or make a takeout double, take a few seconds to classify your hand. Is its value minimum (12 to 15 high-card points), medium (16 to 18 HCP) or even better (19 or more)?



Just identifying the value of the hand may save you from making costly errors of judgment. It can be easy, in the heat of the moment, to overstate your values or to bid the same values twice.

Minimum rebids by opener:

- Repeating your own suit at the lowest level available.
- Raising responder's suit at the lowest level available.
- Rebidding notrump at the lowest level available.

In the auction 1♦ - Pass - 1♥ - Pass; 1♠, opener could have 17 or 18 points, so responder usually should try to keep the bidding open. Opener's rebid of a new suit at the one level, then, isn't always weak.

Medium, or invitational, rebids by opener

- Making a jump rebid of your own suit at the three level.
- Making a jump raise of responder's suit at the three level.

Jumping to 2NT is a bit stronger, showing 18-19 for most players — too much to open 1NT but not enough to open 2NT. Responder is allowed to pass on a lowly minimum.

Maximum rebids by opener:

- Jump shifting.
- Raising to game in responder's suit.
- Making a splinter bid, for example, 1♣ - Pass - 1♠ - Pass; 4♦ to show a powerful hand,

four-card spade support and a singleton or void in diamonds.

It's not easy for opener to force the bidding, but jump-shifts and splinters require the responder to keep the bidding open at least to the game level.

Like opening bids, takeout doubles promise opening-count values in support of the unbid suits. With favorable distribution, 12 or more HCP aren't necessary:

Say your right-hand opponent opens 1♦, and you hold
 ♠K J 9 8 ♥A 8 6 ♦2 ♣K 8 5 4.

The hand has only 11 HCP, but it is certainly worth a takeout double, given the singleton valued at three playing points. If the auction gets competitive, you will be happy if you and your partner discussed the situation ahead of time.

Say partner bids 1♥ in response to your takeout double of 1♦, and the opener bids 2♦. There are two points of view on handling this situation.

The first is that a raise in competition guarantees nothing more than four-card support. It does not show extra values, but partner might need to know whether your takeout double include three or four cards in the suit he just bid.

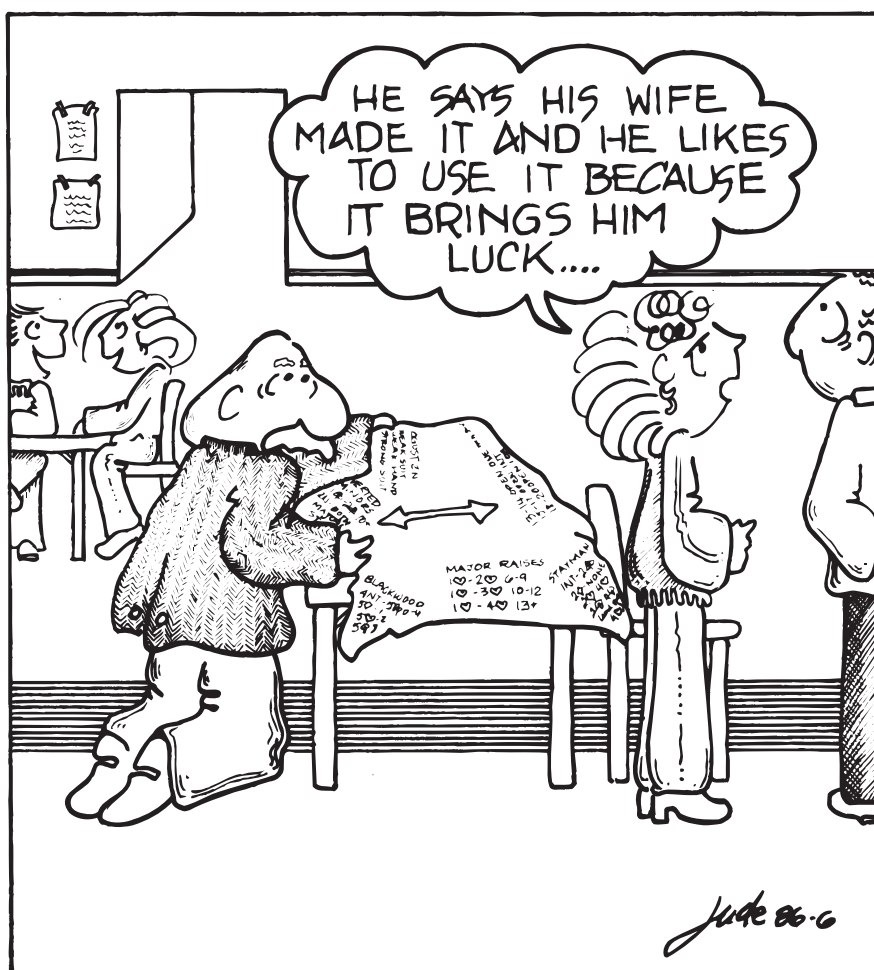
The other way of looking at this situation is that any "free" raise by you shows extras.

If, for example, you double 1♦, partner bids 1♥ and opener passes, a bid of 2♥ by you shows more than minimum hand.

Think about it. The free raise to 2♥ is a game invitation, but the 1♥ bid showed 0-8 HCP. You must have a hand in the range of 16-18 HCP. If you jump raise, it shows 19-21, and if you raise to game in the face of a bid that could have zero HCP, it shows a mountain.

Players are much more aggressive in the bidding these days, so it will probably work better for you to agree that a raise in competition simply confirms four-card support.

In any case, be sure to discuss this situation with your partner to avoid confusion.



Thinking bridge

Opening lead: ♣7.

Bidding commentary: South's jump rebid of 3♥ is not forcing. It shows six or seven hearts with 9-11 high-card points. North has a minimum opening bid, but he does have three wonderful cards for South: two aces and the ♥Q, a card worth its weight in gold facing serious length. North has a no-brainer raise to 4♥. Aces and a fitting honor(s) in partner's long suit(s) are just what the doctor ordered.

Defensive commentary: When there are three bid suits, lead the unbid suit if no other lead stands out.

Play commentary: Counting tricks, South appears to have nine: six hearts, two clubs and one diamond. An extra trick or two might be secured

by ruffing clubs in dummy. Counting losers, South has two spade losers and two possible club losers. Nothing can be done about the spade losers, but the club losers can be ruffed in dummy.

Are there problems? There are always problems. If the first club is ruffed low and East overruffs and returns a trump, South winds up losing four tricks: two spades, the overruff and eventually a club. To avoid this embarrassment, declarer should ruff the

third club with the ♥Q and the fourth club with the ♥8. If the fourth club is overruffed with the jack, South still has 10 tricks: six hearts, one diamond, two clubs and one club ruff in dummy.

Sometimes with two losers to ruff, it is right to ruff the first one high and the second one low, particularly if there is a danger of an early overruff.

Vanderbilt endgame

This play problem produces an attractive ending. Consider your chances in 4♥:

Dir: South ♠ K 10 8 4
 Vul: E-W ♥ 10 9 6 3
 ♦ J
 ♣ K J 4 2

♠ A 7 3
 ♥ A Q 8 5
 ♦ Q 10 5
 ♣ Q 9 8

West	North	East	South
			1NT
Pass	2♣	Pass	2♥
Pass	4♥	All Pass	

West leads the ♠5 (third and fifth leads) to the 4, 9 and ace. You play a club to the king and ace, West suggesting an odd number. Back comes the ♠Q as West produces the 2, so you still don't know who has the spade length.

You win the ♠K, and you now need to pitch your spade loser. The easiest way to do that is to finesse the ♥Q, cash the ♥A (the ♥J dropping on the right) and cash three clubs to pitch your spade. This is the ending:

♠ 10 8
 ♥ 10 9
 ♦ J
 ♣ —
 ♠ —
 ♥ 8 5
 ♦ Q 10 5
 ♣ —

Needing three of the last five tricks, it may look as if you need to ruff out the spade, but that is not so. When you lead the ♦J from dummy, what is East (holding the ♦A) to do? If he rises with the ♦A to cash the ♥K, he can't play a diamond next or it sets up a diamond for you. If he plays a spade (high or low), you can build a trick with the 10-8. And if he ducks the ♦A, West can win the ♦K, but can't play a trump, so you can crossruff and just lose the ♥K.

Lall's 4♦ was a splinter raise of hearts, and Chorush's redouble showed first-round diamond control. Les tried 4NT to show a diamond fit and longer clubs, and Lall then cuebid 5♣. Chorush cuebid 5♦ (a re-cuebid?) and North-South came to rest in 5♥.

On lead, Les considered his options. It seemed clear from the auction that North-South had first round control in the minors, so he tried the ♠K. When that held, he continued with the ♠10. Gloria alertly overtook with the jack and played a third round of spades, promoting West's trump queen.

Down one was a 13-IMP gain, when 5♥ succeeded at the other table on a very different auction.

The good result was part of a losing effort, however, as the Moss team defeated Lindop's squad 132-113.

No calls, please

Cell phones, audible pagers or any similar communication equipment may not be operated or operable in the playing area during a session of play at NABCs except for health-related equipment or by permission of the director-in-charge of the tournament or event.



Parking? Two Great Deals!

Park in the **Beaubien Place Parking Garage** at amazingly low rates: \$8 per day on weekdays and just \$1 per day on weekends. **You must present a discount coupon to get these rates.** (Standard rates are \$12 and \$5.) These coupons are available at the Tournament Information Desk (Level 4, West Foyer).

The Beaubien Place Parking Garage is attached directly to the RenCen via an interior, covered walkway. You don't have to go outside to get to the playing site.

When you enter the garage, pull the parking ticket. When you exit, present the ticket and the coupon to the cashier to receive the discounted price, which is also good for multiple night stays. Please note that there is a handy map on the back of each coupon.

The least expensive parking during the week is at the **GM Lot** along the river. This is a very large surface lot near the Marriott. It costs only \$3 per day. On weekdays, you will not find a less expensive place to park.

Entry fees

Players must be ACBL members whose service fees or dues are current in order to compete in any of the following nationally ranked events: Baldwin



North American Pairs (Flight A), Silodor Open Pairs, Vanderbilt Knockout Teams, Leventritt Silver Ribbon Pairs, Rockwell Mixed Pairs, Lehar IMP Pairs, Whitehead Women's Pairs, Jacoby Open Swiss Teams, and the Machlin Women's Swiss Teams. The entry fees for these contests are **\$18** per player per session.

Players must also be current ACBL members to play in the Bean Red Ribbon Pairs, the Golder North American Pairs (Flight B) and the President's Cup North American Pairs (Flight C). The entry fee is **\$16.50** per player per session.

Regional championships are **\$15.50** per player per session for ACBL members, **\$17.50** for nonmembers.

All other events are **\$14.50** per player per session for ACBL members, **\$16.50** for nonmembers.

Slow Play

Slow play, as opposed to careful or thoughtful play, is discourteous to your opponents — and to all other competitors as well. Players and pairs who take more than their allotted time are subject to penalty.

In general, pairs who are rarely late will be warned while pairs who are habitually tardy and/or pay no attention to time limits will be penalized.

The Rockwell Mixed Pairs, which concludes today, is a four-session event with two qualifying and two final sessions. Each pair must consist of a male and female partnership. The Rockwell Trophy, donated by Helen Rockwell in 1946, is presented to the winners.

The record-holder in the Mixed Pairs is Sidney Silodor, who won the event five times -- including 1955 and 1956 with Helen Sobel. John Crawford won the event three times -- in 1948 and 1949 with Margaret Wagar and in 1959 with Dorothy Truscott, the first time they had ever played together.

Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems to be appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

A club to dummy for a diamond ruff brought him to the critical moment of the deal. It might have been right to take a spade finesse, but he elected to ruff a diamond, play the ♠A and ruff a spade, then ruff the fourth diamond and ruff another spade, bringing down the ♠K.

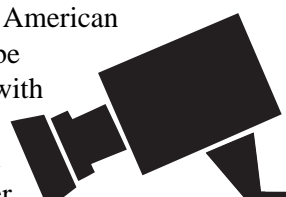

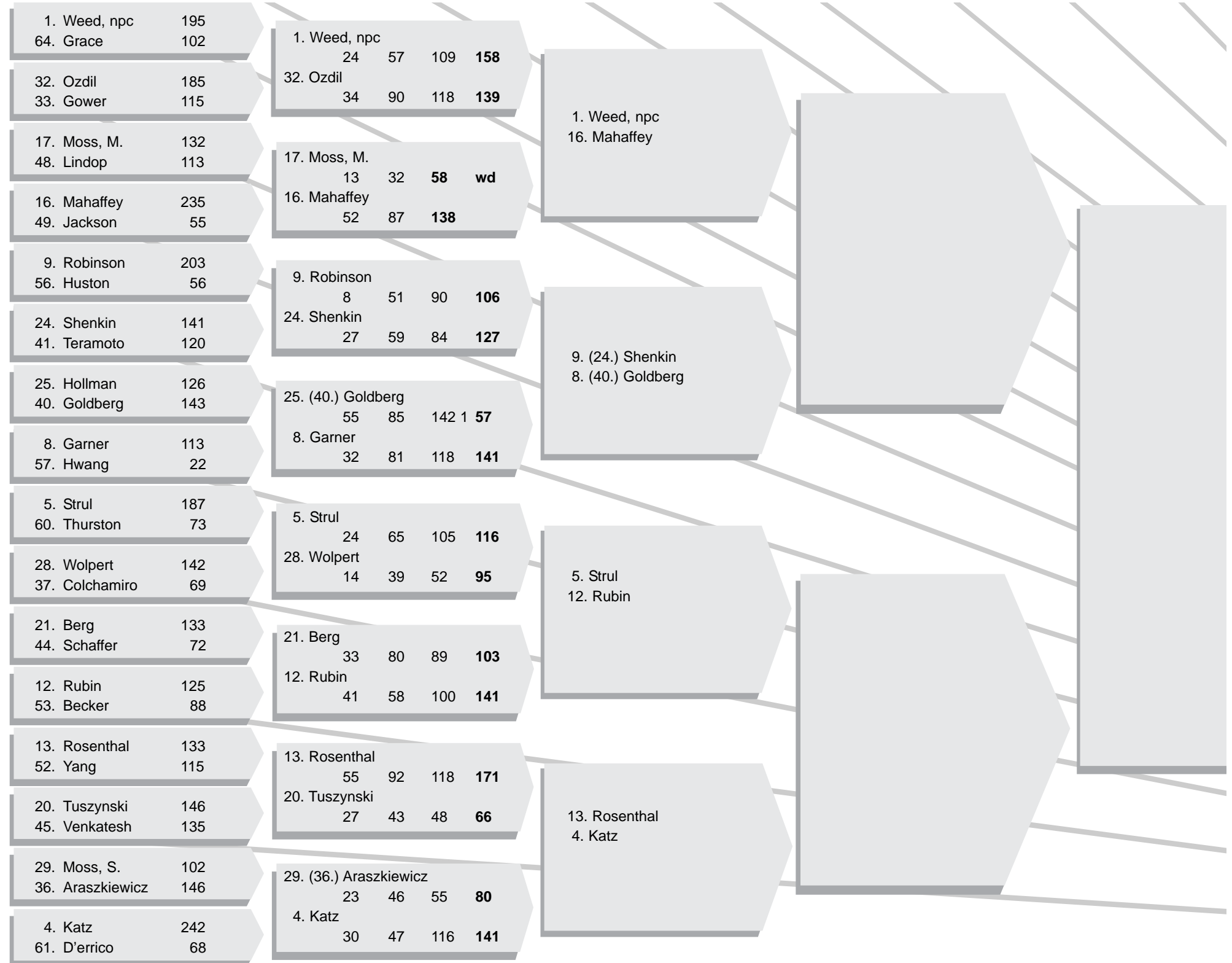

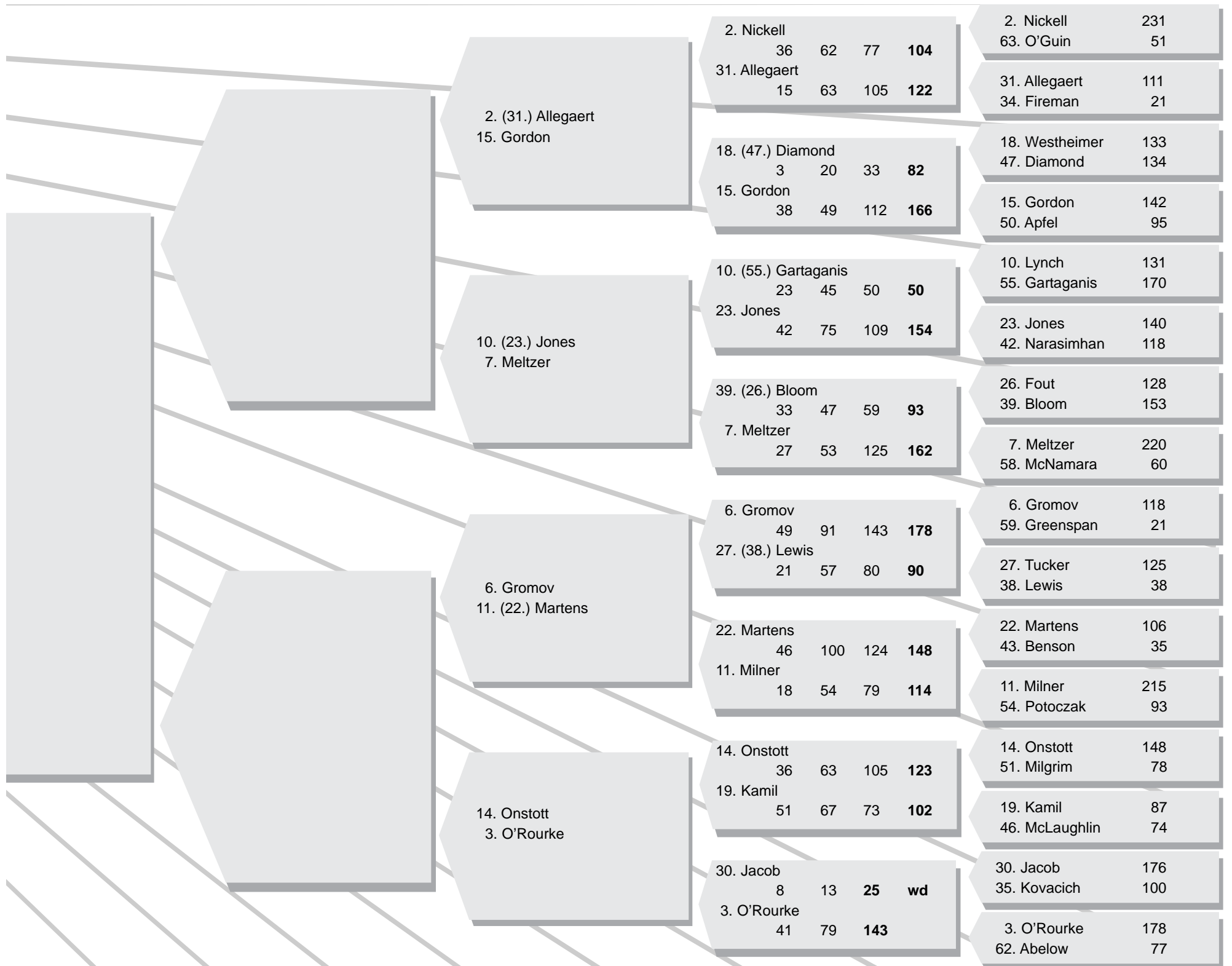

Detroit 1981: A look back

The Renaissance Center was the site of the NABC the last time it was held in Detroit — 1981. It was Spring, and there were 8216 tables in play.

Times have changed. Then, upside-down count and attitude required a pre-alert and a big red sticker on the convention card. Players could ride an old-fashioned trolley to downtown Detroit for 25 cents — now it's called a people mover and costs 50 cents. One of the entertainment highlights then was called Dinner in Canada. For \$3.00 players got a bus trip into Canada and a full meal with tax and tip included — no passports required.

The North American Pairs was called the Grand National Pairs, and a somewhat unknown pair came in 8th — Eric Rodwell and Jeff Meckstroth. Later that year they were to win their first Bermuda Bowl. There was no such thing as the Internet, but you could mail the Daily Bulletins to home or to friends for \$5.50. A survey was taken of ACBL members who attended. It asked: Shall there be a rank higher than Life Master?

There was entertainment and the highlight was called "A Bridge Review" and featured a collection of songs and skits about the history of the game and one of its stickiest components — partners. The narrator was Zeke Jabbour, an "ex-renaissance man and now the Michigan Turkey." Local players participated and gave renditions of songs with special lyrics such as "I'll Never Bid A Slam Again."

But an NABC is mostly about the bridge — here are some deals that were reported in the Daily Bulletin.

A series of good decisions

Ted Horning and Robert Lebi had to do a lot of things right to score well on this deal. They had to push the opponents to the five level, not take the save at favorable vulnerability, make a lead-directing bid and then refuse to let the player who made it take the trick in that suit. Confused? Read on.

Horning's double of 2♦ was takeout, and Lebi was happy to show his four-card suit. But Horning wanted to make sure Lebi got off to the right opening lead if they defended, so he trotted out 4♣. Then when the opposition pressed on to 5♥, East-West decided to defend rather than sacrifice, even though they would have down only 300.

Lebi led the ♣5* (third best from an honor), and declarer took his ace. After drawing trumps and cashing two spades, declarer led a diamond off dummy and won the ♦K when Horning ducked. Declarer went back to dummy and led a club, and once more Horning ducked, allowing Lebi to win the jack and return a diamond to sink the contract. That was worth 11.5 on a 12 top.

Strange way to make 3NT

Preempts are extremely hard to handle, and this deal from the Grand National Pairs certainly qualifies.

Joe Silver was sitting South and had a problem when that 3♥ call came around to him. He didn't want to double — too much chance his partner would bid spades and find a bad split. Because nothing looked good, Silver took the aggressive course — he bid 3NT.

The ♥Q was led and Silver won his singleton king. He could see only eight tricks and no real prospect for a ninth. Finally he decided to run clubs, and look what happened to West. How could West guess that Silver had bid 3NT on a singleton? And if Silver actually had another heart, then West was never going to get in again — his partner would be out of hearts. So he discarded three hearts. Now when Silver led a diamond and East won it, West could take only three heart tricks when East produced the remaining heart. That was all 14 matchpoints for Silver and his partner Mike Rosenbloom. For once, aggression overpowered preemption.

Using weak two-bids can be strong

Helen and Bob Blakey won the Grand National Pairs. They made good use of weak two-bids to score terrific boards.

Bob's 4♠ bid put terrible pressure on South, and who can blame him for trying 5♦? Bob's bid could just as well have been preemptive.

Helen got off to an intriguing lead — the ♠9. In their methods, this shows the 10 or nothing higher. But Bob knew Helen did not have the 10 — there it was in dummy — and he was sure she had the ♠Q for her bid. So what could it possibly mean? Aha! Maybe it was a suit preference signal.

Declarer put up the ♠K and Bob took his ace. He then used a suit preference signal of his own — he led the ♥4. When Helen ruffed this, she led back a club, in response to the signal for the lower side suit. Bob won, gave Helen another ruff, watched Helen take her trump ace, then won the club return and cashed the ♠J for a 1400-point set.

If you look at the North-South hands, it appears that 2♥ is going down. The defense led the ♠J and collected the first three spade tricks. Now, East led a fourth spade. Bob took advantage of this to get rid of his club, and West wasn't willing to "waste" his ♥K, so he discarded, too.

Bob was able to ruff with the ♥4 and take the diamond finesse, losing to the king. A diamond came back to his ace, and he cashed the ♥A, dropping the king. Now he was solid except for driving out the trump queen.

A gem of a defensive play

Bob and Jane Teel found a defensive play that could prove to be the best such maneuver of the entire tournament. It came up during the first qualifying session of the Grand National Pairs.

Strange bidding and a strange contract. But at hearts, with trumps breaking 3-3, declarer can get rid of his losing clubs on the spades after picking up the trump suit with only one loser on two finesses. In other words, the Teels were headed for a bad board as some pairs went set in 4♠.

Jane led the ♦K, and the unthinking play by East would be the deuce — East certainly had no interest in a diamond continuation. But Bob thought further than that — he realized he didn't want a switch either. So he played the ♦8!

Jane continued with the ace and a third diamond, and declarer took a club pitch on the ♦J. Next declarer finessed the ♥J, and Jane won and led a fourth diamond. Declarer's house of cards collapsed. If declarer ruffed low, Bob's trump 8 would force the ace and establish his queen. If declarer ruffed high, Bob would merely discard and his ♥Q 8 over dummy's ♥9 2 would have to produce a trick eventually. And finally, if declarer discards from dummy, Bob discards, too. Declarer is forced to ruff with his last low trump, so again the ♥Q will set up as the setting trick.
