## 67 foreign stars still in Spingold

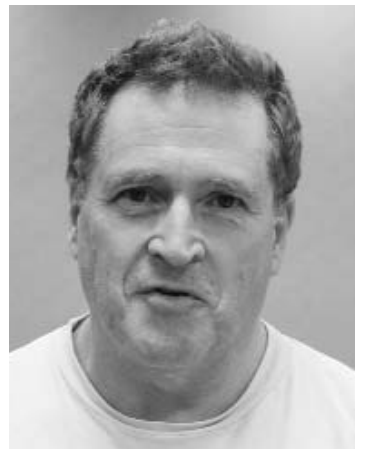
All the top seeds advanced in the Spingold Knockouts yesterday and will lead the way into today's Round of 64.

Other countries: Poland 9, Italy 8, Norway 7, Sweden 5, Bulgaria 3, Israel 3, Turkey 2, Egypt 2, Australia 1, France 1, Japan 1.

## Fontaine earns 10,000th MP

Walter Fontaine, a veteran player from Rhode Island, passed the 10,000 masterpoint mark Saturday at the Summer NABC.



The North Providence resident is retired from the Rhode Island Department of Corrections, where he worked in research and publications. The former president of the Rhode Island Bridge Association is also a former member of the ACBL Board of Governors. He now teaches and directs bridge games.

## Lampert's love affair still going strong

How many 87-year-olds will present themselves to the partnership desk to play a two-session game at this tournament? Harry Lampert will.

Lampert loves the game. He started playing bridge in the Thirties, mainly with older brother Bernard, a National Collegiate Par Tournament winner playing at Cornell while on the G.I. Bill.

Lampert had joined ACBL before he went into the Army in 1942, but had little time for bridge. Making a living first in animation, then in public relations and as a print cartoonist, Lampert developed a comic book figure, "The Flash," which is still popular with comic book devotees.

He always played some bridge, often with Bernard (who became a New York lawyer and arbitration specialist), and he began in the mid-Seventies to look forward to retirement in 1975 and

## Kennedy upset in Wagar Knockout

All but one of the top seeds in the Wagar Knockout Teams advanced to the second day. The lone casualty was the No. 4-seeded squad captained by Betty Ann Kennedy, eliminated with two losses in a four-way match.

Kennedy, of Shreveport LA, was playing with Linda Lewis, Las Vegas; Lisa Berkowitz, Old Tappan NJ; Joann Glasson, Pennington NJ; Margie Gwozdzinsky and Susan Wexler of New York City.

They lost in the first match to a team captained by Ellen Cherniavsky of Silver Spring MD (Barbara Ames and Diane Walker, Gaithersburg MD, and Rae Dethlefsen, Reston VA). In the second match, against the other loser from the morning session, Kennedy fell to the team led by Nadine Wood, Silver Spring (Terry Michaels, Prairie Village KS; Laurie Kranyak, Bay Village OH, and Linda McGarry, Stuart FL).

The top-seeded team, led by Lynn Baker, sat out the first day of play, but joins the field as the round of 16 begins today.

## Play for a world title in Transnational Mixed Teams

For most world championships, it is necessary to qualify in your home country to take part. In the last few years, the World Bridge Federation has offered expanded opportunities for world championship play.

Such an event is the third World Transnational Mixed Teams Championship, scheduled to take place during the World Bridge Olympiad in Istanbul, Turkey, Oct. 23 through Nov. 6. The Mixed Teams will begin Nov. 2 and will be played in 15 rounds of 10 boards each to qualify teams for the semifinal and final rounds.

## Benson climbs over 10,000 barrier



Dick Benson of Leroy IL topped the 10,000-point mark in masterpoints recently. He is the second in his family to do so. His son-in-law, Ralph Katz, is a Grand Life Master with more than 15,000 points. His wife, Chris, is on her way

to 10,000 with 8000 points. His daughter, Martha Katz, World Junior champion in 1991, has 4000 points. Even his grandson, Sam Katz, is going strong – he already has 200 points even though he's only 16 years old.

"Sam beat me in the Flight A Knockouts at the Green Bay Regional. That's a point of pride for both of us," said Benson. "Sam usually goes to NABCs, but he couldn't come this time – he's playing in the state high school baseball championship in Illinois."

Benson was a counselor for at-risk high school kids – he got them jobs – but he retired about eight years ago. He was chairman of a highly successful Team Trials in Milwaukee in 1972.

### What an appetite Johnny Wiser had

Johnny Wiser, longtime national tournament director who died recently, had the gift of being able to make everyone happy with his rulings. He also was multi-lingual, which made him a fixture at international tournaments. But what surprised people about Johnny was his appetite. He always was in good shape, but look what Henry Francis reports that Johnny had for breakfast one morning in Boston.

He started with a full breakfast of bacon and eggs, hash browns and toast – plus a large glass of milk. As he was finishing this, he called the waitress over and asked for a full order of pancakes along with more toast and another large glass of milk. As his friends watched in awe, he called the waitress again. “I’d like a breakfast steak with hash browns and all the fixings,” he said. “And another large glass of milk.” He ate – and drank — it all!

One thing Johnny didn’t eat was fish, which caused a bit of a problem when he was assigned to a tournament in Amherst, Nova Scotia. The locals were planning to throw a lobster feast in honor of Johnny and Henry. Henry called the tournament chairman and told him about Johnny and fish. “Don’t worry,” he said.

The chairman met them when they deplaned in Moncton, and his first words to Johnny were, “Are you the one who doesn’t like fish?” How could he know that, Johnny wondered. When they checked into the hotel, the desk clerk saw his card and asked, “Are you the one who doesn’t like fish?” The woman who was assistant chairman asked, “Are you the one who doesn’t like fish?” It became too much for Johnny when the elevator operator asked, “Are you the one

After winning the opening club lead, he came to hand with the ♦K, then won a trump trick with the 8. He ruffed a club, cashed the ♦A and ruffed a diamond, happy to see the suit split. He ruffed another club and down came the ♣K. So it was all over. He drew trumps, got rid of dummy’s losing heart on the ♣Q, crossed to dummy with the ♥A and claimed, gaining 13 IMPs because his opponents stopped in 6♠.

Zia won the diamond lead in hand and immediately led the ♠K! North won and played a low heart. Zia ducked (!) and South won his ace and returned the suit. That gave Zia the discard for his other spade and a diamond. But he could see the problem – he needed to ruff diamonds in dummy and prevent South from overruffing or discarding his diamond (which he would do if Zia tried to ruff a spade to hand).

So Zia sneakily led a trump toward his hand, and when South ducked it was all over. Zia won in hand, ruffed a diamond, ruffed a heart and ruffed another diamond to reach this ending:

## Never give up

Going into the final quarter of the Grand National Teams, Championship Flight, the District 9 team was trailing their District 16 opponents by 35 IMPs. Making up such a deficit is a tall order, but it’s certainly not unheard of.

In fact, two members of the District 9 team – Jeff Meckstroth and Eric Rodwell – saw their opponents, down 53 IMPs entering the fourth quarter, tie the match and eventually win in overtime in the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams in Reno earlier this year.

Here are a couple of key deals from the decisive fourth quarter that propelled Florida, captained by Jim Mahaffey, to victory. Other members of the winning team are Gary Cohler, Michael Seamon and Barnet Shenkin.

This deal was a body blow to the District 16 team.

At one table, Mike Passell opened 1♥ and North overcalled 1NT, which was doubled by Eddie Wold in the East seat. South redoubled as a runout, and when North bid 2♦, Wold doubled again. That was passed back around to North, who ran to 2♠. Wold, uncertain whether a pass in that situation would be forcing, simply bid 3NT. There was no problem in the play, and Wold ended with 10 tricks for plus 430.

North-South were punished much more severely at the other table, where Sidney Lazard and Bart Bramley opposed Seamon and Cohler.

Lazard’s takeout double was perfectly normal – he just happened to catch his partner with a true yarborough. The defense was brutally accurate.

Seamon started with the ♠A, switching to the ♦9 at trick two. Bramley went up with the king, taken by Cohler with the ace.

A low club was next, and Seamon won the ♣A and returned the suit. Bramley won the ♣K and could have gotten out for down five had he cashed dummy’s two high hearts. Instead, he played a spade from dummy. Cohler alertly rose with the ♠Q, pulled the opposing trumps with the ♣Q and ♣10 as Bramley discarded a spade from dummy.

Now when Cohler played a spade to Seamon’s hand, dummy was squeezed when Seamon cashed his fourth spade. If Bramley discarded a diamond from dummy on the fourth spade, all three diamonds in Cohler’s hand would be good. If Bramley discarded one of the winning hearts to maintain the diamond stop, Seamon would get out with a heart to the bare ace, Cohler could unblock to make the high heart declarer’s last trick.

That was down six for minus 1400, a loss of 14 IMPs. Had Bramley cashed the two high hearts before playing a spade, he would have been minus 1100 and the match would have ended in a tie.

When you lose a set by 37, of course, there are

## Computer battle under way today

The ACBL established an official World Computer Bridge Championship in 1996 that has run annually ever since at a major bridge activity. This year’s championship is being held in Concourse H here in the Hilton starting today. Kibitzers are welcome.

The top bridge-playing programs, or robots, from around the world are competing. Can JACK (the Netherlands) retain its three-year reign as champion? Will last year’s runner-up, Bridge Baron (USA) take over the top spot? The 2002 finalist, Wbridge (France), the 2001 finalist, Microbridge (Japan), the 2000 champion, Meadowlark Bridge (USA), the 2000 finalist, Q-Plus Bridge (Germany) also will be in strong contention. There are other contenders as well – Blue Chip Bridge (United Kingdom) and Sabrina (France) are possibilities.

The format is a round-robin team event with the top four robots advancing to a semifinal knockout match.

Seamon apparently felt he had done enough with his 7 high-card points, so he declined to reveal his ♠K.

Bramley made the normal-looking lead of the ♥K, and Cohler cross-ruffed for 12 tricks.

It appears that a trump lead would defeat the contract, but the favorable lie of the club suit makes the slam unbeatable, albeit on a double-dummy basis.

If South leads a trump, East can win in hand, cash the ♥A and ruff a heart, re-enter his hand with a spade to the ace, ruff another heart, then make the key play of the ♣J from dummy, blotting out South’s ♣10. North has to cover, but later when declarer, having drawn trumps, plays a club to dummy’s 9, the defense is dead. North can win but he has no heart to return. Declarer can enter dummy with the ♠K and discard his losing heart on the ♣8.

This is the line of play one would take looking at all the cards. Would – or should – anyone find that line in real life?

West led the ♦A, not the best start for the defense, but it didn't really matter – because of the bidding Fontaine was alert to the likelihood that spades were not breaking.

He ruffed the diamond lead, cashed a high spade in case the suit was breaking 5-0, then played a low club to the king in dummy. He then cashed the ♦K, pitching his ♣A, and used the club suit as trump substitutes. If East ruffed in, Fontaine would be able to pick him up. With the hearts breaking favorably, the slam would be home. If East did not ruff in, Fontaine could discard all of his hearts and take the spade finesse for 13 tricks.

At the other table, the North-South pair went down in 6♥, so Fontaine's team gained 17 IMPs.

The event was first played in Rhodes, Greece, in 1996, and repeated in Maastricht, Netherlands, in 2000. Teams can be made up of any combination of countries, with at least two men and two women playing in mixed partnerships.

Entry fees are \$800 for new teams, free for players eliminated from the Olympiad. If a team is composed of players from the Olympiad and new players, the players who have not competed will be charged \$150 per person for a team of six, \$200 per person for a team of four.

ACBL members who wish to enter should e-mail [internationalevents@acbl.org](mailto:internationalevents@acbl.org) or call (901) 332-5586 and ask for International Events. Entries are due by Aug. 15, although late entries may be accepted if there is sufficient space at the venue.

The World Bridge Olympiad and concurrent events will be held in the heart of Istanbul at the Grand Cevahir Hotel and Convention Centre, which combines a state-of-the-art convention center with an extremely comfortable hotel. Accommodation will also be available in hotels nearby, which will include 2- and 3-star hotels as well as the more expensive 4- and 5-star hotels, so that as wide a range of rates as possible can be offered to players coming to the championships.

### 6079 tables so far

New York 2004 passed the 6000-table mark yesterday. Total attendance to date is 6079 tables.

playing more bridge.

Bernard led the way, making Life Master in the Fifties. More than just playing, though, Lampert wanted to teach bridge. He had become a cartooning teacher while still active in the advertising agency he built, and he applied the same energy and zest to this new project.

Lampert began teaching bridge in 1976, becoming a Life Master that year. The other "credential" he thought essential to being credible as a bridge teacher was to be an accredited teacher, so he joined the American Bridge Teachers Association that year.

Best known today to many bridge players because of his very successful, cartoon-filled books, *The Fun Way to Serious Bridge*, *The Fun Way to Advanced Bridge*, and *The Fun Way to Advanced Bridge Play*, Lampert developed the books after his cartoons were a big hit with his bridge students in Roslyn NY and at the ABTA convention in Chicago in 1977.

He first published the books himself because, as he puts it, "No sane publisher would take a book of cartoons for teaching bridge."

Using his knowledge of the publishing business from his advertising days, he and his wife, Adele, produced and promoted his books. He has sold nearly half a million bridge books, and all of his books are still in print — now published by Baron Barclay.

Lampert is also a regular at comic book conventions, enjoying the changes in that craft, too. Lampert and Adele, married 61 years, still play bridge together two evenings a week.

On Saturday morning, he went down to the partnership desk looking for someone who has the energy to keep up with him and enjoy the game.

## No smoking means NO SMOKING!

New York law prohibits smoking in public places. Players found smoking inside the Hilton (including restrooms, stairwells and interior corridors) will be assessed a Zero Tolerance penalty of one-quarter of a board, applied to the event in which they are playing.

## EXTRA! EXTRA! Read all about it!

When you are playing a six-board stanza, every deal can be critical. This deal helped decide the extra boards in Rigal vs. King.

Dlr: South ♠ 10 7 2  
 Vul: Both ♥ K 4  
 ♦ 8 7 6 3  
 ♣ K Q J 10

♠ K 3 ♠ Q J 9 8 5

At one table Jay Stiefel played 3NT on the auction of 1NT-3NT. The opening lead was the ♥7, and the normal defense seems to be to win and shift to a hopeful ♠Q. Declarer ducks, wins the next spade and drives out the ♥Q. With the aid of the diamond finesse declarer has nine tricks.

But no, East meanly ducked his ♥A, turning declarer's two heart tricks into one. Now there were only eight tricks.

In the other room the King team stopped in 2NT on this auction: 1NT-2♣-2♥-2NT. If declarer came home with eight tricks, his team would win. However, as West I had been warned off the heart lead, so I led a diamond to the king and ace. Declarer quite reasonably led a heart to the king and Jeff Aker's ace, and Jeff shifted to the ♠Q. When declarer took the ♠A, I unblocked the king. I won the next heart with my queen and led a spade through dummy for down one.

Note if South ducks the first spade, Aker will shift back to a low diamond. Then I would have unblocked my ♦J under the queen, but that is only five tricks for the defense. Declarer should probably get that right: if East had the ♥Q and five spades he might have shifted to a low spade. If spades are 4-3, then nothing matters unless diamonds are 5-2.

## Notice to players

Each player must have an ACBL convention card filled out and on the table. Other types of convention cards, such as the WBF convention card or homemade cards that do not sufficiently resemble the ACBL convention card, are not acceptable substitutes.

## History of the Spingold

The Spingold Master Knockout Teams, first known as the Challenge Knockout Teams, was contested for the Asbury Park Trophy in the early days. The runner-up team in the regularly-scheduled portion of the event had the right to challenge the winners to a playoff. This right was never utilized.

In 1934, 1936 and 1937, the Masters Teams-of-Four and the Asbury Park Trophy were separate events, providing two sets of winners. In 1938 the event became the Spingold Master Knockout Teams.

At one time, the Spingold was a double elimination event, usually lasting nine or 10 sessions. It was scored by International Match Points and was restricted to players with 100 or more masterpoints.

In 1965, the double elimination method was replaced by three qualifying sessions (subsequently reduced to two), followed by single elimination knockout matches. The preliminary qualifying session was dropped in 1970.

The Spingold Trophy, donated by Nathan B. Spingold in 1934; the Vanderbilt Trophy, awarded to the winners of the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams at the Spring NABC, and the Reisinger Memorial Trophy, donated by the Greater New York Bridge Association in memory of Curt H. Reisinger and awarded to the winners of the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams, are ACBL's most highly prized team trophies.

## Spingold trivia

- Louis H. Watson (*Watson's Play of the Hand at Contract Bridge*) was a member of the winning Asbury Park Trophy (Spingold) teams in 1932 and 1935.
- B. Jay Becker and son Michael are the only father-son combination to win the Spingold. Their victory came in 1972.
- Edith Freilich and Billy Seamon are the only sister and brother to win the Spingold. Their 1963 team included Russ Arnold, Harold Harkavy, Al Roth and Cliff Russell.
- Rose Meltzer became the first woman since Freilich (in 1963) to win the Spingold. Her victory came in 2001.
- Bob Hamman is the all-time leader with 12 wins in the Spingold. Bobby Wolff and Howard Schenken have won the Spingold 10 times.
- Oswald Jacoby also won the Spingold 10 times: in 1932, 1933 and 1937 for the Asbury Park Trophy; in 1934 and 1936 for the Masters Teams-of-Four and in 1938, 1939, 1945, 1950 and 1959 for the Spingold.
- Helen Sobel won the Spingold five times, the first time in 1944 and the last time in 1960.

## Three Spingolds

Nowadays there are three Spingold competitions — the main event and two Mini-Spingolds. One is for players with 0–5000 masterpoints, the other for players with 0–1500 masterpoints.

The events debuted in 2001 in Toronto where 72 teams entered the 0-5000 event while 36 teams competed in the 0-1500 event. The events drew 53 teams in each game the following year in Washington DC, then dipped to 41 and 36 teams respectively last year in Long Beach. Here in New York 40 teams entered the 0-5000 and 32 began competition in the 0-1500.

## Box Office Bridge

Bridge has been a thread in the fiber of pop culture for years. Even in the movies. Hollywood seems to capture the friendliness, strategy, camaraderie, socialization, teamwork, class and other positive attributes most associated with the game. Just for fun, here's a list of a few films featuring bridge.

Which ones have you seen? What would you add to the list?

*Grand Slam*, starring Paul Lukas and Loretta Young. A new husband learns to play bridge to please his wife, who loves the game and is a dedicated player. One night he surprises her and her bridge club by beating them with his own rule: No rules on bidding or play. This starts a snowball of worldwide media attention. 1933.

*Metropolitan*, with Carolyn Farina, Edward Clements. A group of diverse upper class New York friends meet each night to play bridge and talk about socialism, ambition, life, and philosophy. (Distributed by New Line Cinema) 1990.

*Night Intruder*, narrated by Floyd Gibbons. The story of four women who meet regularly for bridge and are disrupted by an intruder breaking in through their window. (Warner Brothers) 1938.

*No Census, No Feeling*, starring The 3 Stooges. Mo and Larry are asked to join in a game of bridge while taking the census at a fancy mansion. 1940.

*The Single Standard*, starring Greta Garbo and Nils Asther in the story of a restless female bridge player who seeks adventure and fulfillment in a succession of romantic interests. 1929.

*Bad Company*, starring Ellen Barkin and David Ogden Stiers in this tale of murder, deceit, and a bridge-playing judge. 1995.

As you can see, Hollywood needs to partner up and put a few more bridge plots in their movies. For now, we'll have to enjoy the few that do exist.

As a note of Hollywood bridge trivia, the great and handsome actor Omar Sharif is a world-class bridge player and first learned the game while on the set of his first movie.

## A seven grows up

Unless you are leading your partner's suit, it will be a rare day when you take a trick against a notrump contract with a four-card suit headed by a 7.

As reported on the following deal by Norwegian Arve Farstad, one of his countrymen did lead from four diamonds to the 7 – and actually won a trick with that card in the end, despite the fact that an opponent held A-J-9-3 in the suit opposite a doubleton king.

The deal was played in the first final session of the Von Zedtwitz Life Master Pairs by Norwegians Martin Andresen and Jon Aabye.

Andresen, who discovered bridge only three or four years ago, now plays at every opportunity, and he is a professional soccer player and captain of Norway's national team. Aabye has represented his country in international competition, earning a bronze medal in the World Team Olympiad in Valkenburg, Netherlands, in 1980.

Aabye led the ♦4, showing two or four cards but not promising an honor. Declarer played low from dummy and took North's queen with the ace.

Now declarer erred by playing the ♥A and a heart to dummy's 10. Andresen won the ♥J and switched accurately to the ♠10, ducked all around.

A second spade went to Aabye's jack, and he got out with the ♣J to the queen, king and ace.

Declarer was now in a bind. He could not afford to surrender a club trick because the defenders already had three tricks in. South would be able to cash the ♠A if he got in with a club. So declarer played a diamond to dummy's king and ran the hearts. South took the last two tricks with the ♣10 and ♦7 after the desperate declarer discarded his remaining two diamonds.

Declarer would have been well advised to look for tricks outside the heart suit. The friendly lie of the club suit would have provided three tricks there, but only if the entries were kept fluid.

The two Norwegians finished ninth overall in the six-session event, and were only a penalty card from finishing in second place – a great performance.

## Narrow escape

The squad captained by Reese Milner, seeded No. 11 in the Spingold Knockout Teams, survived a major scare in the first round of the event when they trailed the No. 68 seed (Leonard Helman) by 27 IMPs.

Part of that margin came via a textbook deal:

That 11-IMP swing was wiped out in the second half when Sam Lev-Piotr Gawrys bid these two sets of hands to slam.

# Summer NABC turns 76

This is the 76th annual Summer North American Bridge Championships – and there have been many changes in this time.

These championships, usually the largest of the three annual competitions, were originally held under the auspices of the American Bridge League. Since 1938 they have been held by the American Contract Bridge League.

In the Thirties the championships were played at Asbury Park NJ and lasted eight days. In post-war years, the program was gradually enlarged to nine days.

In 1969, the NABC became a 10-day tournament and in 1979, a pre-tournament Charity Gala was added. In 2002 in Washington DC, 276 pairs played in the Educational Foundation Stratified Open Pairs, 55 pairs played in the Educational Foundation Stratified 299er Pairs and 74 teams competed in five brackets of the Educational Foundation Bracketed Knockout Teams.

In 1930 the Knockout Team event (now the Spingold Master Knockout Teams) attracted an entry of 16 teams and 22 pairs entered the Master Pairs to play for the von Zedtwitz Gold Cup. In DC, 103 teams entered the Spingold and 504 competed in the Life Master Pairs.

The earlier competitions were held in Asbury Park NJ, New York City and Chicago. Since 1950, however, the NABC has been held in a different city: Columbus, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Miami, Los Angeles and Denver, among others.

Here are highlights:

### Chicago, 1971

Freak hands are always troublesome and this one from the Mixed Teams proved no exception. Jo Morse and Steve Robinson were one of the few pairs to reach a laydown grand slam.

After Robinson made his descriptive 5♠ rebid, Morse judged well with her next two bids. Rather than tamely raising her partner to 6♠, she cuebid 6♣ en route. When Robinson showed interest in a grand slam with a diamond cuebid, she judged correctly that he must be looking for the ♠A K. Accordingly, she jumped straight to 7♠ which was unbeatable.

### Boston, 1981

A Spingold semi-final match saw the eventual winners (Ralph Katz, John Sutherlin, Allan Stauber,

Eisenberg led a heart to dummy's ace and Gerard cashed the ♣A K, pitching his losing heart as Trent ruffed with the ♦J. Trent returned a heart and Gerard ruffed. He ruffed a spade in dummy and led a low club.

Trent ruffed with the ♦Q and led a trump. Gerard won in dummy and ruffed a club with his ♦9. He picked up East's last trump and run the now-good clubs. Down one was minus 50 for North-South.

Hamilton's 4♠ bid begged his partner to choose a minor suit. Solodar, who had been willing to let Hamilton play 2♠ doubled, now decided to let him play 4♠ undoubled.

Sutherlin led the ♠A and switched to a top heart. Hamilton won his ace and cashed the ♣A. He continued with the ♣Q, ruffed by Sutherlin with the ♠8 and overruffed with dummy's ♠10.

A diamond went to Hamilton's ace and he led another top club. Sutherlin ruffed with the ♠4 and Hamilton overruffed with dummy's ♠5. Hamilton led a diamond to his king and led a low club. Sutherlin discarded and dummy ruffed.

Hamilton exited with dummy's low heart. Sutherlin cashed the ♥Q and the ♦Q, then exited with the ♠6. Hamilton won dummy's ♠7 and cashed the ♠K but gave up the last trick to West's ♠Q.

Down one was minus 50 for North-South – and an unlikely push.

### Baltimore, 1987

India's Jaggy Shivdasani made his first appearance in an American tournament – and walked away as champion of the 1987 Spingold Knockout Teams.

Shivdasani played with Harry Stappenbeck, Brian Glubok and Dan Rotman.

Shivdasani was recommended to Glubok by

Zia about 10 minutes before registration for the Spingold closed. Said Zia, "Jaggy is much better than the players you usually play with."

Stappenbeck agreed. "We had a secret weapon," he said. "Nobody knew Jaggy, except Zia. But Zia told us that Jaggy is the second best player in the Middle East. We all know who number 1 is."

Arnold led a club, dummy's jack holding. Shivdasani played a diamond to his king and ducked a diamond. Chazen won and switched to the ♥Q.

When declarer played low, Arnold overtook with the king and returned a heart, won by the ace. After running his diamonds and seeing Arnold discard two spades, Shivdasani cashed the ♣A K and threw Arnold in with a club, forcing a spade return away from the ace.

Making three for plus 600 and a 10-IMP gain since West for Mahaffey opened 1NT in the other room and played right there.

## Monitoring

At this and future North American Championships, ACBL will be monitoring NABC+ events with visible, real-time cameras. The images will be recorded and will be available for later official inspection and review.

By general monitoring of the session and participants' behavior, ACBL has another source of information that may be useful in determining facts and settling issues arising from some types of ethical and behavioral complaints or actions. 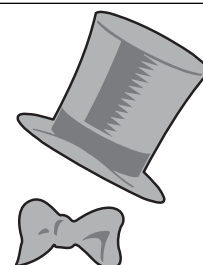

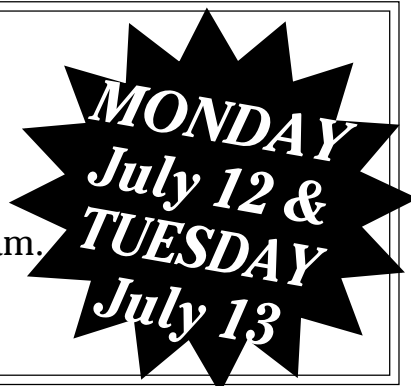
