What does Cooper Galvin, 11, want to be when he grows up? "I want to be a bridge professional. I want to get paid for playing bridge."

He and his family traveled from their home in Anchorage AK to Southern California for a Thanksgiving family reunion. As soon as they got to California, Cooper kept telling his father and mother about the North American Championships in Phoenix and what fun it would be to go there and play a few times.

He must be a good salesman because they're here – his father, Pat, his mother, Alyse and his brother Sean, 9. All four are having a wonderful time competing in the Intermediate/Newcomer events.

The high point for Cooper so far is winning one of Eddie Kantar's books at the I/N reception. That gave him the chance to meet the former world champion and talk with him a bit. And of course Cooper now has a book signed by one of the world's greatest bridge players and perhaps the finest bridge writer in the world.

It's a natural assumption that the parents took up the game first and introduced the boys to bridge. Not so – not at all. "My relatives got me into the game," said Cooper, "and I had no idea what I was getting into."

The first to bring up the idea of bridge to the boys was their great-grandmother, Mary Skaats of Anchorage. Then her sister, Ruth Pease, and her brother-in-law, Walt Pease, took over as the boys' mentors. Ruth and Walt had got

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Greco, Hampson win squeaker
in Life Master Open Pairs

Eric Greco and Geoff Hampson eked out a win in the Life Master Open Pairs in a closely contested finish where less than a board separated the top seven pairs.

Greco and Hampson claimed their third North American championship as a pair: they won Open Pairs I in 1997 and the LM Pairs in 1998. Each has won additional North American titles and each is a former Junior player who now plays professionally.

Their score of 2992.14 – top was 90 – edged runners-up Larry Cohen and Steve Weinstein, who scored 2953.64.

Following closely were Boye Brogeland and Tony Forrester with a score of 2934.96, Paul Lewis and Danny Sprung, 2928.05; Jeff Meckstroth and Jim Reiman, 2923.02; Norberto Bocchi and Lew Stansby, 2915.65, and Chris Larsen and Nels Erickson, 2914.99.

Menton aura entices
American players

Panos Gerontopoulos of Greece is wearing a different hat at this tournament. He has been a regular at NABCs in his capacity as chairman of the Youth Committee of the World Bridge Federation. This time he is here as honorary secretary of the European Bridge League. His goal is to convince Americans how much fun they will have if they make the trip to Menton, France, in June for the first-ever European Open Championships.



"We've needed something like this for a long time," said Gerontopoulos. "America has already opened its championships to foreigners, and the tournaments are better for it. The level of competition rivals that of the world championships. Now Europe is doing the same thing – we want the kind of competition that American and other outstanding players around the world can give us. It will make the bridge world even more of a family."

It's worth listening to Gerontopoulos. He has made Junior bridge a popular worldwide event. He has helped

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Breed, Quinn: four in a row

No pair ever won the Life Master Women's Pairs two years running – until 2000. No pair ever won the LM Women's Pairs three years running – until 2001. No pair ever won the LM Women's Pairs four years running – until last night.

Mildred Breed and Shawn Quinn, standing fourth after two qualifying rounds, posted a mammoth 71% session in the first final session and coasted to victory by more than two full boards. Their final score was 866.46 to 802.16 for runners-up Jan George and Roni Gitchel.

Gila Guttmann and Gail Bell were third.

Quinn, ranked #1 in World Bridge Federation rankings for women players, and Breed, ranked #4, have been playing together four years and they have an imposing record: first in the World Women's Team Olympiad, third in the Venice Cup and second in the McConnell Cup earlier this year. Quinn won the Olympiad in 1996 and the World Women's Pairs in 1998. She was second in the 2000 Venice Cup. Breed had a win in the 1997 Venice Cup.

Beating cancer is a serious game

For Janet Daling, trying to solve the mysteries of breast cancer and of a bridge deal have certain similarities – in either case, "you look for the pieces of the puzzle."

Daling, a Diamond Life Master who has won more than 12,000 masterpoints and has been second "a few times" in nationally rated events, is a professor of epidemiology at the University of Washington School of Public Health and Community Medicine. She's also a lead researcher at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center, Weiss-Daling Division.

Daling's main job is to design studies to determine causes of breast cancer, apply for grants and conduct studies. Once the data is gathered, Daling and her colleagues then analyze the data and present their findings in manuscript form in medical journals.

At the Hutchinson Center, the Weiss-Daling Division employs 80 to 120 people "who conduct our studies. Twenty-two bridge players have worked for me over the years – plus 10 spouses or children. I like to support the bridge community – they're smart people," says Daling.

Daling started out as a mathematician and earned her degree at Washington State University.

Daling's bridge was on hold during this time. She actually learned to play while in high school but played little while in college. After graduation, she and her first husband were stationed at Lackland AFB in Texas. They played at the Officers' Club and "came in bottom the first week and bottom the second week. Then I bought *Goren on Bridge* and we started winning."

Sue and Bob Erwin of Portsmouth RI took up bridge in 1977 and quit a year later. Why? They had kids. "We looked forward to the day we could play duplicate again, but for the next twenty-odd years bridge was forgotten," said Bob.

Both children are now graduate students at Brown and Penn State, so the Erwins returned to the bridge table at the Bermuda Regional in 2001. "We had a wonderful time there – everyone was so friendly," said Sue. "And we won some points, including a few golds. We didn't play again until May, but we managed to win about 60 points, including 12 golds, during the rest of the year."

They made their first NABC venture in Las Vegas last year, and they enjoyed themselves so much that they vowed to go to another. "Our kids didn't appreciate it," said Bob. "They wanted us to be home for Thanksgiving."

"We're having a great time here. Everyone is so supportive."

East led the ♥Q to Hamilton's ace, and he led the ♣Q, ducked. After ruffing a heart, he led a club toward the jack, which won the trick when West ducked again. Hamilton switched to a diamond and rose with the king when East played low. He was virtually certain East had the ♦A because West had already showed up with the ♥K and probably the ♣A and had not opened the bidding in third seat.

Hamilton now called for the ♣K, pitching his last diamond as West played low for the third time and East ruffed in with the 8. East tried to cash the ♦A, but Hamilton ruffed and then trumped another heart with the 10. He ruffed another diamond and then trumped a third heart with the king. His top three spades took the last three tricks for plus 680.

The only trick he lost was a trump. We bet that's not the suit you chose.

Barrett to represent District 20 on Board

The ACBL Board of Directors has recognized the resignation of Robert Lix as of Dec. 3. In accordance with its bylaws, the Board recognizes the incumbent first alternate, J.G. (Jade) Barrett of Vancouver WA, as District 20 director for the period Dec. 3, 2002, through Dec 31, 2004.

Barrett has been very active in Junior bridge. He has been non-playing captain for some of United States teams, was founder and chairman of the North American Youth Bridge Foundation, and a member of the Board of Appeals for the European Youth Bridge Festival from 1997-1999. He is a Diamond Life Master in both the ACBL and the American Bridge Association.

In earlier years he was a chef and a musician, but he now is a bridge club director and operator.



It takes two

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only Class A conventions and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, he or she may give warnings or assign such penalties as he or she deems appropriate under the circumstances.

Marsha May Sternberg Women's Board-a-Match Teams

The Marsha May Sternberg Women's Board-a-Match Teams, which begins today, honors a woman who was struck down by cancer last year at the age of 52. Her husband, Dr. Jim Sternberg of West Palm Beach FL, donated the trophy. Dr. Jim will be on hand at the close of the event to present the trophy to the victors.

Marsha Sternberg was a former National Enquirer associate editor and the first female writer for the tabloid. Marsha, once reported to be the highest paid female journalist in America, left the Enquirer in 1989 and married Dr. Sternberg, a radiologist and bridge enthusiast. She joined ACBL in 1990 and became a Life Master in 1997.

Marsha was outstanding in many fields – she was an excellent pianist, golfer, tennis player and sailor. She and her husband were given the title of Count and Contessa of Abruzzi for their philanthropic work in Italy.

In her memory at the University of Minnesota School of Journalism, a \$60,000 scholarship has been endowed – the Marsha Sternberg Fellowship Fund in Health Journalism scholarship.

Her husband tells this story about the 1994 world championship in Albuquerque NM. "I had lost in the quarterfinals of the Rosenblum and went to sleep. When I woke up, a trophy was on the table in our hotel room. I asked, 'Marsha, did I win something?' She said, 'No, I won the novice Swiss.'"

Coffin Trophy

The previous trophy for this event was the Coffin Trophy, one of the oldest and most historic trophies in NABC competition. It will be retired.

For years there was only one "National" Women's Team championship -- and that was a board-a-match event.

Donated by Charles Emmet Coffin in 1933, the trophy was contested at the "Winter Nationals" in the days when there were only two NABCs – Summer and Winter. In 1963 the event was moved to the new Spring NABC where it was in play until the format was changed to knockout teams in 1976.

For the next decade, there was no national Women's Board-a-Match championship. Swiss teams had become popular and a Women's Swiss with NABC+ rating was established in the early Eighties. But board-a-match play for women was not dead -- it was just in hiatus for a few years.

The Coffin Trophy was revived at the Fall NABC in Atlanta in 1986 and new life was breathed into women's board-a-match play.

Many experts consider board-a-match the most exacting form of the game. Equal weight is accorded each deal and every trick is important when scoring is board-by-board.

Jayne Thomas (left), president of the ACBL Charity Foundation, and Don Moeller, Foundation treasurer, presented a \$5,000 check to Season for Caring. Accepting the check was Beverley Bradshaw, a member of the Unit 354 (Phoenix) Board of Directors and the Unit charity chairperson. Season for Caring is sponsored by the Arizona Republic newspaper. The Robert McCormack Fund will match 50% of dollars donated and all administrative costs are absorbed by the newspaper. The donation, which will now total \$7500, will go to 108 charities throughout the state of Arizona.



Open Board-a-Match Teams

Last year's Open Board-a-Match Teams was decided by the narrowest of margins – .01 – as the reigning Bermuda Bowl champions captained by Rose Meltzer claimed victory in the two-day event.

In what was one of the closest finishes ever in a North American championship, the top four teams finished less than one board apart.

The Mitchell Trophy

Players will be competing for the Victor Mitchell Trophy, which honors one of bridge's most colorful characters -- a champion player, philosopher and mentor to the stars.

Mitchell, a Grand Life Master with more than 10,000 masterpoints, won five North American championships including the Spingold in 1956 and 1959, the Life Master Men's Pairs in 1962 and the Men's Teams in 1962 and 1963. He was named ACBL Honorary Member in 1988 and inducted into the Bridge Hall of Fame in 1996.

The couple split up, however, and after a 10-year period, Daling decided to go to graduate school. She earned her Master's in BioStatistics and her PhD in epidemiology (the study of what causes diseases) at the University of Washington.

She went to work at the Hutchinson Center in 1978 and began to play a little bridge. Nowadays, she plays at NABCs and regionals that are fairly close. "Playing bridge on a Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday is pretty rare for me."

Daling says she sometimes thinks about retiring but "in my field, there's always something new for me to study."

"I get just as big a charge out of doing well at bridge as I do at doing well in my work. Besides that, if I retired, who would take care of all these bridge players?"

She ducked the first trick, won the diamond continuation, cashed the ♠A and ran all the clubs. This was the three-card ending:
