## Defenses to 1NT



Ask a group of experts about their favorite methods of competing when an opponent opens a strong 1NT (15-17), and you will receive a variety of answers. The Daily Bulletin will feature one method each day during the NABC.

Today's expert is Mel Colchamiro, who has a different perspective on this topic.

During the NABC, the Daily Bulletin has featured various methods for competing when an opponent opens a strong 1NT. They are all good, although we have seen there is a difference of opinion about which method is best.

One common thread, however, is that most experts believe it pays to come in aggressively directly over a strong 1NT opener. I agree. It is not the purpose of this article to argue for one method over another.

I wish to cover a more fundamental question: On what types of hands should one enter the auction after a 1NT opener?

I have developed a guideline that will help you answer this question. I call it Mel's Rule of 8. At the very least, it is an effective guide to "get you into the ball park."

It's okay to overcall 1NT directly on this formula:

Take the number of cards in your two longest suits

Subtract the number of losers by loser count (see below)

If the answer is 2 or higher, bid something

If the answer is 1 or zero, pass.

### Figuring losers

♦A K 7 6 5	One loser, missing the queen
♥K J 5 3	Two losers, missing the ace and queen
◆Q 8 4	Two losers, missing the ace and king
♣6	One loser, missing the ace

### Rule of 8 examples

Example 1

♦A K 7 5  
♥A Q 8 6 5  
◆K 4 3  
♣7 6

In No. 1, there are eight cards in the two long suits but seven losers (two each in spades, diamonds and clubs and one in hearts). You should pass despite the 12 high-card points and five-card major.

In No. 2, you have 10 cards in your two long suits and seven losers (two each in spades, hearts and diamonds and one in clubs). The difference is three, so you should get in there. It's only 6 HCP, but distribution is the key.

## Irving, Penticoff lead chase for Red Ribbon title

Ned Irving and Denny Penticoff hold a narrow lead among the qualifiers for today's final two sessions of the Bean Red Ribbon Pair. The Arkansas pair had 54.9% in the afternoon and followed with 66.45% in the evening.

In second place are Adam Ruprecht and Jeff Ford, followed by Saul Agranoff and Joyce Pearson. Yesterday's play saw 99 tables enter the two-day event. Fifty-two tables qualified for today's play.

The Red Ribbon Pairs is an event with national rating and is open to persons with fewer than 2000 masterpoints. Players earn qualification by placing first or second overall in regionally rated events of at least Flight B status.

## Two big games boost Women's Pairs leaders

Valerie Westheimer and Migry Zur Campanile had two big games to lead the qualifiers going into today's final two sessions of the Whitehead Women's Pairs. Both games were more than 63% ant that resulted in a carryover that is 30 points ahead of Gigi Weinstein and Janice Seaman-Molson, who lie in second place.

In third place are the young Swedish ladies, Cecilia Rimstedt and Sara Sivelind, who won the Smith Women's Life Master Pairs last November in Hawaii.

going to the cause, administered by The Citizens Foundation, a non-profit, non-political organization in Pakistan.

The goal of the fund-raising was to bring in enough money to build a school in one of the hardest-hit areas. Zia arrived at the NABC in St. Louis with the news that the nearly 100% of the money needed - more than \$144,000 - has been raised.

"Almost all of the money," Zia said, "has come from bridge players around the world. This is evidence that bridge players care about people outside the bridge world."

Zia reported that excavation has begun in the village of Her in Mansehra in the Northwest Frontier Province, a remote area that was

West led the ♦A and shifted to a club won by the ace. East led a second club won by Marty. Since East had the ♣A and West had bid to the four level, West surely had the ♥K.

Marty ruffed a diamond, played a heart to the ♥A, cashed the second top club, then ruffed the third diamond. Next came the ♠A K.

Marty led a second heart, and West was endplayed to lead a minor for the ruff and discard, so declarer avoided a spade loser altogether.

At another table Gaylor Kasle was in the same contract and also found this line of play.

On this deal from the Rockwell Mixed Pairs, Pamela Granovetter needed to double an opponent to have a chance to defeat the opposing contract. If that sounds mysterious, read on (hands rotated).

Granovetter felt she had to double to protect the possible plus 140 she and partner Richard Katz were due, but the double was also intended to make sure of defeating the contract - if indeed that was possible.

Granovetter figured that without the double, if she led the ♠A and continued the suit, Katz might not find the killing defense - a third round of spades. It is the only defense to defeat 4♦ (declarer will never misguess in hearts, given the bidding).

So Granovetter led the ♠A and continued with a spade to Katz's queen - and he worked out that a third round was the killer. Granovetter ruffed with her singleton ♦10, later getting the ♥A for the setting trick. Plus 100 was good for 22 out of 25 matchpoints. Minus 130 would have been a 2.

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# JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS



## Bidding suits you don't have

Cuebids are wonderful bidding tools, and the advancing bridge player should have them in his bidding arsenal. Cuebids can be confusing because they mean different things in different auctions. One thing they always mean is, "Partner, keep bidding."

Every bridge player trying to learn cuebids has had to play in a 3-1 fit (or worse) at the four level. My personal record is a 1-2 fit at the five level.

There are other bidding tools you can use that involve suits you don't really have. Here's an example:

**♠K J 7 3    ♥A 8 2    ♦K 9 8 3 2    ♣8.**

North         East         South  
1♣              Pass            ?

You have four trumps and an opening hand in support of spades. What's the best way to describe this hand? It might seem strange, but the best bid in this case is 4♣. Yes, you have only one of them, and that's the point. You are employing what is known as a "splinter" bid in support of spades. The bid shows a singleton or void in the suit bid and at least four-card trumps support (plus enough values for your side to be in game).

The singleton is perhaps the most important feature of the hand. Splinter bids are double jumps over partners' bid and are usually at the four level. One exception is when partner opens 1♥ and you have a splinter raise with a singleton spade. You would not want to bid 4♣ because partner would be forced to the five level in hearts. So over 1♥, 3♣ would describe the game-forcing hand with shortness in spades. Some partnerships agree not to make a splinter bid when the singleton is an ace or a king. That is something you and your partner should discuss

before adding splinters to your convention card.

A great facet of splinter bids is that it allows you to evaluate your holding in the suit your partner is short in. For instance, you hold

**♠A Q 8 6 2    ♥K 9    ♦A J 10    ♣10 9 3.**

You bid 1♣, and partner jumps to 4♣, showing an opening hand with four or more trumps and a singleton or void in clubs. Great, the opponents have the ♣A K Q J and are going to take only one trick (perhaps none) in that suit. Start thinking slam and bid 4NT.

Splinter bids do not always improve your hand, however, as in the case where you hold

**♠A Q 8 6 2    ♥Q 3    ♦Q 7 6    ♣K J 6.**

You open 1♣, and partner jumps to 4♣. It's time to slow down the bidding. Four of your high-card points are in your partner's short suit. As a general rule, except for aces, high-card points opposite extreme shortness are not pulling their full weight.

Splinters are most often made by responder, but opener can get into the act as well.


You, South, hold

**♠A Q 4    ♥A Q 7 3    ♦3    ♣K Q 10 8 6.**

This is the perfect hand for a splinter raise of partner's hearts. Jump to 4♦. This bid shows four trumps, a singleton or void in diamonds and a hand strong enough to force partner to the four level even if partner has a bare minimum response of 1♥ (as little as four hearts and 6 HCP). It's now up to partner to look at his points and the holding in the diamond suit to determine if further action is warranted.

North might have a hand such as

**♠K 6 2    ♥K J 5 4    ♦8 5 2    ♣A 9 4.**

If South has a low singleton diamond, that means all of North's high-card values are facing high cards in the South hand – a perfect fit. North-South are on their way to another 28-point slam.

Just remember, when you and your partner start using splinter bids, you may have to play in a 3-1 fit until you get the hang of it.

## Thinking bridge

**Opening lead: ♦5.**

**Bidding commentary:** North's jump shift shows 19 or more high-card points (possibly 18 with a 6-4 pattern) but South's major-suit distribution is not clear. For the time being, the responder (and the defenders) assumes five spades and four hearts. To raise to 4♥, opener's second suit, responder needs four hearts. Responder is allowed to prefer to 3♣ with a doubleton, but with stoppers in both minors, 3NT is a more descriptive rebid. North passes 3NT, knowing South has minor-suit strength and that South knows of five spades in the

North hand.

**Defensive commentary:** East rises with the ♦A and returns the ♦7, the higher of two remaining cards. With three remaining cards, the lowest is returned. South plays the 9 and West wins with the 10. West knows, or should know, from the return of the 7 that the ♦K is not going to bring down the queen. West must be patient, lead something else, and wait for partner to get in and lead a hoped-for third diamond. West does best to exit a club in case partner has the ace and

declarer has the ♠Q and ♥J. As it happens, East doesn't have the ♣A, but has enough strength in clubs and spades that declarer cannot come to a ninth trick without letting East in. Once East gets in and leads that remaining diamond, it's curtains for South. More often than not, third hand's return of the suit partner has led (♦7), sets the tone for the defense.

**Play commentary:** Against this defense there isn't much declarer can do but take the spade finesse for a ninth trick. Not this time.



## New players are adventurous

Here is an example from the 2000 Bermuda Bowl. Paul Soloway held  
**♠A K J 7 3    ♥Q 8 2    ♦Q 7    ♣K 6 5**  
and heard Brazil's Roberto Mello open 1NT (15-17) on his right. Did Soloway bid or pass? Mel's Rule of 8 suggests a pass: eight cards in the two longest suits minus seven losers equals one, so pass is recommended despite the 15 HCP and nice spade suit. Soloway did indeed pass and defeated 1NT two tricks. Soloway had not heard of the Rule of 8, but he did what it suggests nonetheless.

Here is another example from the Silver Ribbon Pairs at this tournament earlier in the week. With a strong 1NT opener on his right, a player held a hand something like  
**♠Q 7 6    ♥A K 3    ♦A 10 6 5 4    ♣8 5**  
and entered the auction with a natural bid of 2♦. The result was a doubled contract and a score of minus 800, what he deserved. With a five-card suit and a flat hand, he should have opted for defense.

If you use the Rule of 8, it will tell you when and when not to bid over their 1NT, and you will avoid disasters of this type.

## Information, please

Jacek Pszczola and Sam Lev, playing on the Reese Milner team, opposed Bob Hamman and Paul Soloway of the Nick Nickell team (hands rotated).

Pszczola found himself in a 6♠ contract as South after Lev (North) had opened the bidding with 1♣ and, at his first chance to speak, Hamman had bid 2NT, showing the red suits.

Hamman led the ♥K against the spade slam, and Pszczola won with dummy's singleton ace.

His next move was the ♠3, and when Soloway contributed the ♠2, Pszczola put in the ♠5, which held. Pszczola knew Hamman had extreme distribution for his 2NT bid. After all, both sides were vulnerable, and Hamman was forcing his partner to choose a suit at the three level.

Pszczola's play resulted in a well-earned plus 1430 - and a 5-IMP loss. At the other table, Jeff Meckstroth and Eric Rodwell were doubled in the same contract, making for plus 1660.

## Notice to players

**Well-earned IMPs**

It is rare to see a team score IMPs by spectacular declarer play at one table and imaginative defense in the other room. But in Tuesday's match between the Carolyn Lynch and Peter Schneider squads in the Vanderbilt Knockout Teams, Larry Cohen and Curtis Cheek (for Lynch) were full value for a 14-IMP swing. Cohen, playing with David Berkowitz, was South.

On the lead of the ♣7, Cohen put up the ace, pitching a heart. Then he played the ♦A, ruffed a diamond, ruffed a club (West following with the 5), ruffed a diamond, cashed the ♥K, played a heart to the ace and ruffed another diamond, reaching this position:

Cohen cashed dummy's ♠K, and East showed out! The key was that, in the four-card ending, West was known to have three spades and a plain card left. Was it a heart or a club? There were two reasons to think it was a heart. West's club lead was consistent with a doubleton - it would have been a falsecard from three. Also, there was perhaps an element of restricted choice: with a club and a heart left, when West discarded on the third diamond he might have pitched a club.

So Cohen ruffed a heart back to hand safely, then exited with his losing diamond. West suffered the indignity of ruffing his partner's winners to be endplayed in trumps.

West might have ruffed the losing diamond to reduce his trumps at trick 8, but Cohen would simply overruff, ruff a heart, ruff a diamond and has different trump endplay.

So what happened at the other table? On the same auction, Cheek, West, led the ♦K!

Declarer could now see he would virtually be able to claim if trumps were not 4-0, assuming that West also had the ♦Q. So South led a spade to the king at trick two: curtains! The full deal:




