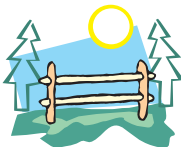
Charlotte Blaiss, ACBL coordinator for Junior programs, will discuss plans for Junior Bridge Camp, scheduled for the Chicago area at the close of the 1998 Summer NABC.

The Costost of the camp is estimated at about \$400 per person, said Blaiss, and only Juniors who are ages 16-23 are eligible.

The first Junior Bridge Camp was held in 1990 during the Summer NABC in Boston. The next camp, patterned after the World Bridge Federation camps, was held in 1996 at Marco Island FL, following the close of the Summer NABC in Miami Beach. Last year's camp was held in Italy.

A highlight of the meeting will be the induction of five new members into the Junior Corps. The ACBL Junior Corps was established in 1990 and its members are charged with promoting bridge among other young players.

## Illinois-New York duo ahead in Non-LM Pairs

Gregory Berry of Buffalo Grove IL and Jay Segal of New Rochelle NY took the maximum carryover of four boards into the final two sessions of the Non-Life Master Pairs today.

Their carryover of 48 matchpoints put them 9.99 ahead of Hall Whitaker and Pu Yu of Rolla MO. In third were Steven Greenstein and John Freed of New York City.

## Expulsion of Sion Upheld by Committee

The Ethical Oversight Committee expelled Steve Sion of Las Vegas during the 1997 Summer NABC. No one appealed this decision. By rule, the Appeals and Charges Committee must review every case where the discipline given is a one-year or longer suspension or expulsion. The purpose of this review is different from an appeal. The Committee examines the record to safeguard the interests of the ACBL, not the player. In this case the Committee did not change the discipline.

Some 175 guests were in attendance, including such bridge luminaries as Norman Kay, Bobby Wolff and Tommy and Carol Sanders. Dozens of special guests were also present, as well as the entire ACBL Board of Directors and many members of the ACBL Headquarters staff. Many local guests and dignitaries came to take part in the celebration.

Roy G. Green, chief executive officer of the ACBL, opened the program by thanking the attendees for "join-

ing us on this momentous occasion."

In addition to the opening of the Morehead Library and the official dedication of the Bridge Hall of Fame, the ceremony also celebrated the ACBL's 25th anniversary in Memphis. Green emphasized that he wants to make ACBL Headquarters "the Bridge Place, not just an office building. This is the place where our bridge heritage is preserved for the future."

ACBL President Howard Piltch reminded the audience of the true significance of the late Albert Morehead's contribution to the world of bridge. "The library is a touch from the past that links us to the present," he said. Longtime Albert Morehead friend Joli Quentin Kansil described the Hall of Famer as "the most astonishingly brilliant man I've ever met." Kansil entertained the crowd with personal anecdotes that underscored the genius and civility that was Albert Morehead.

Special guest speaker Andrew Morehead, son of Albert, said, "My father specified in his will that his personal library should go to ACBL. That was the seed. I am pleased that the library has reached such fruition."

Green also thanked Paula Sheinwold, widow of bridge giant Alfred Sheinwold, for her contributions to the library project.

Former ACBL President Bobby Wolff spoke of how the vision of the Hall of Fame was kept alive by Green and former ACBL President Virgil Anderson. Wolff, outgoing chairman of the Hall of Fame committee, praised the efforts of everyone who had labored to create the institution to honor the greats of the game.

At the close of the ceremonies, guests were treated

to a buffet. ACBL staff conducted tours of the Headquarters building which, in addition to the library and Hall of Fame, also displays hundreds of photographs of bridge players, past and present.

Retired tournament director Jack Hudgins, who spent much of his directing career in the Mid-Atlantic, Florida and New England but now lives in Memphis, was impressed with the photos.

"This is just wonderful," he said, pointing to a group picture that featured Oswald Jacoby, Dick Frey and Edgar Kaplan. "I know these people. This was my life for 35 years." Anderson was also pleased with the results.

"I really got a tug tonight walking around looking at the pictures, especially the black and white ones," he said.

The evening was topped by a team game. Guests, dignitaries, ACBL Board members and staff were randomly mixed to create the 26 teams that participated. □

the 57-year-old resident of Regina SK, there is a high level of respect for him on the ACBL Board.

"Dick and I came to the board together," says Howard Piltch, 1997 ACBL President. "Our first meeting was the one at which (former CEO Steve) Signaigo was let go, and Dick and I voted the opposite way on every vote. I wondered how we were going to get along. Now my opinion of him is so high that when I made my first appointment as president I picked him to be the chairman of one of the most important committees, by-laws and study."

Anderson, says Piltch, "is not flashy, but he is a person of deep substance. He doesn't speak often, but when he does, his fellow board members listen."

Cecil Cook, who represents District 23 on the ACBL Board, agrees. "Dick is quiet, but he listens well and talks only when he has something to say. People listen to him."

Richard Anderson was born in Broadview SK, but his family left for Regina shortly after he was born. He has been there ever since. "I'm a Regina boy, tried and true," he says.

Anderson is the middle child of three, the son of a school teacher who later ran a small family restaurant -- "a beastery," as Anderson puts it. His younger brother Lynn lives in St. Albert, a suburb of Edmonton. His sister, Carole, lives in Vancouver.

Residents of Regina, located 100 miles north of Plentywood MT, are necessarily hardy types.

"We enjoy very cold winters with lots of snow, running from November to March," he says. "A few weeks of the year at minus 40 degrees is not unusual."

As a youngster, Anderson was very much into sports and competition, and he spent a lot of time at the YMCA. His preferences were football and baseball. "There was very little demand," he says with a laugh, "for five-foot-four guards on the basketball team."

Anderson discovered bridge --- "another natural form of competition" --- between his junior and senior years of high school when his grandmother taught him and his brother to play. Anderson's grandmother played in Vancouver with a group of friends who called themselves the Sunshine Girls. Later, when Anderson became more serious about the game and began to learn conventions, his grandmother was appalled.

"She thought it was cheating to use Stayman," he recalls, "because it was bidding a suit you didn't have."

Lynn didn't take to the game, but Richard did. He soon found three others interested in bridge and they all went down to the Regina Duplicate Bridge Club to try their luck.

"We quickly discovered that we didn't know much after all," he recalls, "and we decided to learn more. We were not discouraged by being destroyed a few times."

Bridge quickly became a passion for Anderson, intensifying when he enrolled at the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon. "That's where I really caught the bug," he says. "A lot of lectures didn't get attended, but I managed to get through all right."

Anderson started out as an engineering student but ended up earning two degrees in education.

While he plied his trade as a high school math teacher, Anderson continued to play bridge. Inevitably, he became involved in the administrative side. In fact, he's been working for bridge for more than 25 years.

It started with an interest in unit affairs. "They were always looking for people to do jobs," he says. Anderson has been president of Unit 573 since 1979. He is also the unit's novice chairman, an accredited teacher and a certified director.

He is a Gold Life Master with more than 4000 masterpoints, nine Blue Ribbon and five Silver Ribbon qualifications.

In 1981, Anderson became a zonal director for the Canadian Bridge Federation. Eleven years later, he was elected to the ACBL Board of Directors to represent Dis-

trict 18 -- covering Alberta, Saskatchewan and northern Manitoba in Canada and Montana, Idaho, Utah and northern Wyoming in the U.S. He became interested in district affairs because he found it difficult to get information. "I thought it should be more open," he says.

Twenty years ago, Anderson met Jan Ganley, another school teacher, at a bridge game. They now have two children --- Leah, 16, and Erin, 14. He has a son, Aaron, from a previous marriage. Aaron, also a school teacher, and his wife, Rochelle, will make Anderson a grandfather for the first time in February.

Leah doesn't play bridge --- she prefers figure skating and playing the piano --- but Erin is a born player.

"Erin is a quick study and really enjoys the game," Anderson says. "She would play five times a week if I let her."

Anderson, a Life Master since 1973, still regards Jan as his favorite partner. "She's a good player, but she took 15 years off from the game to raise the family."

Anderson said he and Jan belie the commonly held notion that husbands and wives can't play together. "We've had our tiffs over the years," he says, "but usually it's when we're playing rubber bridge and I bid a grand slam on a finesse."

Jan is also deeply involved in bridge administration as secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Bridge Federation and of Unit 573, club manager and a member of the ACBL Board of Governors.

Anderson retired in January of 1997, which he considers a prerequisite for undertaking the duties of ACBL President.

Now that he's retired, Anderson is able to play more bridge --- three to four times a week at the club, and he's planning to travel to 10 to 15 regionals as ACBL President.

Looking forward to 1998, Anderson sees it as a year of change. "Our new marketing plans will go into effect and there will be a change in our CEO."

Anderson is a strong backer of Zero Tolerance, the effort to raise awareness of the importance of good behavior at the bridge table --- a movement which started in Canada.

"Duplicate has a bad reputation," Anderson says. "If we can overcome that, we will succeed."

Bridge, Anderson believes, should be played for fun. "I understand that it's a serious game, but it doesn't require quite the intensity that some people have."

Many of Anderson's best times at the table have come sitting opposite Cecil Cook, who says Anderson "responds to my one-liners very well."

Anderson also has a strong belief that the Internet and computers are important to the future of bridge. "The electronic age is calling," he says, "and we have to answer the call."

He says fears that OKbridge and the Internet will hurt bridge clubs have proved to be unfounded. "People are learning bridge on the Internet," he says. "We can actually gain members."

At Regina's last sectional, Anderson recalls, two players who had met on OKbridge traveled long distances from opposite directions to play together in per-

## ACBL denies petition, suspends John Peters

John Peters of Birmingham AL petitioned the ACBL for additional membership privileges. The Board of Directors readmitted him on condition that he play only at club games in his home unit. However, the evidence proved he played at tournaments during 1996 and 1997.

The Appeals and Charges Committee denied his petition because he violated the terms for his readmission. In addition, he forfeited all masterpoints earned while playing above the club level and he was suspended for 90 days.

son. "We were impressed by that," he says.

As a school teacher, Anderson maintained a casual approach to teaching and found that it worked well. He expects to be relaxed as 1998 ACBL President. "My goal is to be a PR person, if you like."

If you see Richard Anderson at the bridge table, say hello. He's as friendly a bridge player as you'll want to meet, even if he is trying to take your matchpoints or IMPs.

"I pride myself," Anderson says, "on being able to get along with everybody." □

## Clued in

When the opponents are bidding all around you and they have a grand total of 9 high-card points, that's information you can often use to your advantage.

East led the ♦3, taken with dummy's ace. With such weak trumps, Letizia knew she needed some help, so she tried a gambit she has seen her mentor, Dennis Clerkin, use many times --- a low trump away from the A Q 7. West hopped up with the ♠K and returned her singleton heart as East signaled encouragement.

Letizia won the ♥A and played a trump to dummy's ace, noting the fall of the 10 -- a sign that trumps were dividing 4-2. It was certain, of course, that West had not started with ♠K J 10.

Because both opponents had bid with almost no values, Letizia deduced that at least one of them was acting because of her shape.

Figuring West for a possible 5-5 or better in the minors, Letizia made the key play at trick five -- she called for the ♣J from dummy, letting it ride when West played low.

That play ensured the contract. Letizia lost two spade tricks and a heart. Plus 420 -- 43 out of 51 matchpoints.

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# U.S. I holds off Chinese rally to retake Venice Cup

The United States regained possession of the Venice Cup, emblematic of world supremacy in women's bridge, at the world championships in Hammamet, Tunisia, in late October. The Americans defeated a tenacious and talented Chinese team, 244-184.

China fell far behind after 96 boards on the first day, but they scored swing after swing in the early going of the final 32 boards and closed to within striking distance. Just when it appeared the Chinese might have a chance to catch up and go ahead, the Americans caught fire and pulled far ahead.

"I beat David," exulted Lisa Berkowitz, who became the first in her family to win a world championship. Husband David is one of the highest-ranked players in North America. "I'm the first in the family to win a world title, but I won't be the last," said Lisa.

"And I beat Fred," said Marinesa Letizia, who was winning her second world gold (McConnell Cup 1994). Fred is her close friend, Fred Stewart, another major star in the ACBL sky.

"Winning a gold is a helluva lot better than winning a bronze," said Mildred Breed. "No doubt about it -- this is the highlight of my bridge career."

"This is a lot better than Yokohama," said Randi Montin, who was fourth in the Venice Cup in 1991. This was her first world title.

"I'm thrilled. I've never been so excited," was the reaction from Tobi Sokolow, also winning her first world championship.

Jill Meyers, the only player who was a holdover from the 1993 Venice Cup winners, said the victory was the result of a tremendous team effort. Several of her teammates were quick to agree.

One other team member also won the Venice Cup in 1993 -- Sue Picus, the non-playing captain. "This is the toughest of the five world medals I have won," she said. She has two previous Venice Cups and the McConnell Teams to her credit, and she was second in the Venice Cup in China two years ago.

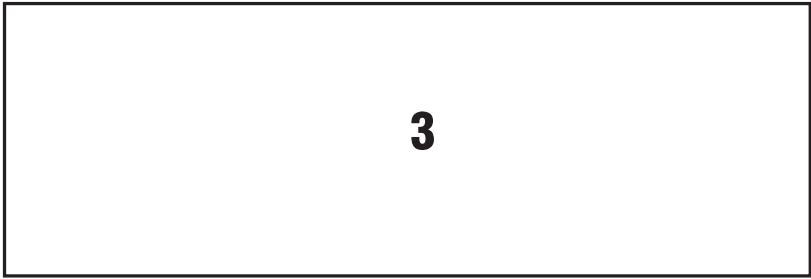
The team had one more member -- an adoptee. Wejdane Majeri, a Tunisian, was assigned as their recorder, but she fast became their friend and confidante. They adopted her as their team mascot.

As the team made their way from the vugraph playing rooms to the vugraph theater, World Bridge Federation President José Damiani and American members of the WBF Executive were waiting with flower bouquets and champagne. As they entered the theater, the Americans were greeted with thunderous cheers and applause. ACBL and WBF Board member Joan Gerard presented the bouquets, and the champagne was poured and delivered by Virgil Anderson, Cecil Cook, Dan Morse and George Retek.

Meanwhile the courageous Chinese team had to resign themselves to second place for the second straight year -- they fell short in the World Team Olympiad last year, again losing to the United States. The Chinese women have established once and for all that China has become a major world power in bridge. Playing for China were Sun Ming, Lu Yan, Zhang Yalan, Gu Ling, Zhang Yu and Wang Wenfei. Sun, Zhang Yalan and Gu have been regulars on the world scene for many years.

The other American team, United States II, won the bronze medal by defeating France, 114-66, in a 48-board playoff. Lynn Deas, who is confined to a wheelchair as she plays, was carried onto the stage in her wheelchair to receive her medal at the prize-giving ceremony. Her teammates were Beth Palmer, Kathie Wei-Sender, Juanita Chambers, Kerri Sanborn and Irina Levitina, with Sue Sachs as non-playing captain.

In the final U.S. I got off to a fast start, winning the opening 16-board segment, 36-5. China quickly turned this around with a 27-4 session.

Berkowitz earned her team a push by rising to the occasion -- literally. She led the ♦A and continued the suit, although a heart switch would have been better. Gu ruffed, cashed her top clubs and the ♠A and led her third club. Berkowitz discarded, so Gu ruffed and then ruffed a diamond back to her hand. Berkowitz won the spade exit and got out with a heart to the king and ace. Declarer then led the ♥8. After considerable thought, Berkowitz rose like a crocodile with the queen, swallowing her partner's jack. She then was cashed the ♥10 for the setting trick.

China had a good third segment to take a 73-61 lead after 48 boards. The Americans did something about this on the first board of the fourth segment.

Both Wests started with a natural 2♣ opener (usually six clubs and the equivalent of an opening bid in high-card points). Both Norths overcalled in spades, and both Easts took approximately the same path to the slam.

## Board of Governors meeting

The ACBL Board of Governors will meet Sunday at 9:15 a.m. Sunday in the Rose Garden Room (Level 4) at the Adam's Mark.

Clearly 3NT is not the place to be -- no chance with an opening heart lead unless clubs split 2-2. Equally clearly, 5♣ is the place to be, making easily even if clubs split 3-1. In fact, with the 2-2 split necessary for 3NT, 6♣ will make. But both Gu and Breed found themselves in the notrump game.

Berkowitz led her partner's suit, so they were able to take four heart tricks and a club trick. Down one.

Breed was infinitely luckier. Wang felt that declarer must have a double heart stopper, so she tried the surprise lead of the ♠Q. Breed may have been surprised, but she knew what to do. She won, knocked out East's club stopper and claimed nine tricks, gaining 10 IMPs.

The match was effectively over when this board came along, but the result was so bizarre that it deserves mention.

Wang's 2NT was a desperate attempt to find a better spot, but it didn't work. Sokolow led her ♦K and continued with the 6. Declarer won and tried a heart to the king, but Breed correctly took her ace immediately and smartly switched to her singleton spade, the king losing to the ace. Sokolow cleared diamonds, but when declarer led a club, she hopped up with the king, cashed her winners and led a club. Sokolow and Breed took the rest to inflict a six-trick set -- plus 1700 for 18 IMPs.

The Americans were exhausted after dealing with the Chinese comeback, but the elation of victory quickly rejuvenated them.

## ACBL's third Junior Month: win points, support Juniors

The third annual Junior Month at clubs throughout the ACBL is scheduled for February 1998 -- and for just \$1 extra, all players will be eligible to win masterpoints at sectional rating.

U.S. funds have been earmarked to support ACBL's Junior Bridge Camp, scheduled for the Chicago area following the Summer 1998 NABC. ACBL's previous Bridge Camp was held in 1996 following the Summer NABC in Miami Beach.

Clubs may run as many Junior Fund games as they have sanctioned sessions. A special reporting form for the games will be included in a December mailing to club managers.

In addition, clubs may now schedule up to four Junior Fund games every month. For more information, contact Charlotte Blaiss, ACBL coordinator for Junior programs, at (901) 332-5586 Ext. 214.

ACBL's first Junior Month was held in February 1996 and players contributed more than \$10,000 for Junior projects in the U.S. and Canada -- primarily, ACBL's Junior Bridge Camp.

Last year's total was \$22,065 with U.S. funds earmarked to send Juniors to the Bridge Camp in Italy and Canadian funds going to the Canadian Junior Development Fund with special emphasis on CYBORG (Canadian Youth Bridge Organization) and Canada's Junior bridge teams.

Junior bridge programs, limited to players aged 25 and younger, were developed by ACBL in the early Eighties. The World Bridge Federation inaugurated a world championship for Junior players in 1987.

The U.S. won its only gold medal in 1991 when the third World Junior Team Championship was played in Ann Arbor MI. Winners were Wayne Stuart, John Diamond, Martha Katz, Debbie Zuckerberg, Jeff Ferro and Brian Platnick. Chip Martel was non-playing captain.

Canada had its best result that year also, finishing in the runner-up spot.

Many Junior players have enjoyed success in their "later" years -- including Geir Helgemo of Norway, silver medalist in the 1993 Bermuda Bowl and bronze medal winner in this year's Bermuda Bowl, and Canada's Fred Gitelman, Bermuda Bowl runner-up in 1995.

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# World Championships -- what they were like

A world championship in a little town in Tunisia? What was it like to play in a Third World country, the first Arabic nation ever to host a world championship?

It was great! The site was beautiful -- right on the Mediterranean. The hotel was modern with an efficient staff and good facilities. Many restaurants with a surprising array of choices were within a dollar's drive in a taxi.

That's all well and good, but what about the bridge?

The playing areas were spacious and well ventilated. Screens and bid boxes were used throughout, including the Transnational Teams, a new event which drew a highly satisfactory 74 teams. Large Daily Bulletins in a newspaper format were available early every morning. One of the computers in the Press Room was open to persons who wished to send and receive e-mail messages.

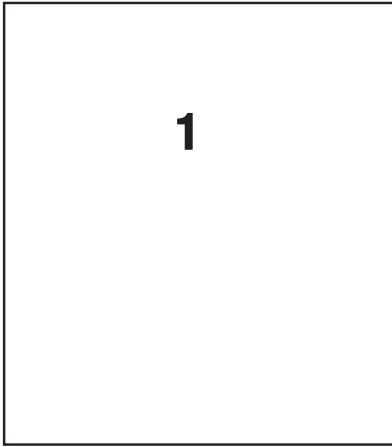
However, the vugraph auditorium left a lot to be desired. It was constructed shortly before the tournament specifically to be used in connection with the tournament. The problem was that it was too small and not at all well ventilated. Luckily, spectators could watch the action on any television monitor in the hotel complex. Four channels were dedicated to bridge -- one to the play, one to the scores and standings, one showing the players in action in the vugraph playing room, and one devoted to results and standings in the Transnational Teams.

But reports of the action weren't limited to those in attendance. Tens of thousands of fans all over the world were following the action on their home computers. The Daily Bulletins also were published on the Internet and could be reproduced to look just like the ones at the tournament.

One of the vugraph commentators riveted the attention of the audience -- Omar Sharif took regular turns on the microphone whenever he wasn't playing in a Transnational match.

Guido Ferraro of Italy, formerly a partner of many-time world champion Pietro Forquet, was especially effective as a vugraph commentator, despite his Italianized English. He offered knowledgeable comment in three languages -- English, Italian and French.

Billy Eisenberg was back as one of the chief commentators, and Eric Kokish was a frequent contributor at the mike. The chief commentator was Jean-Paul Meyer



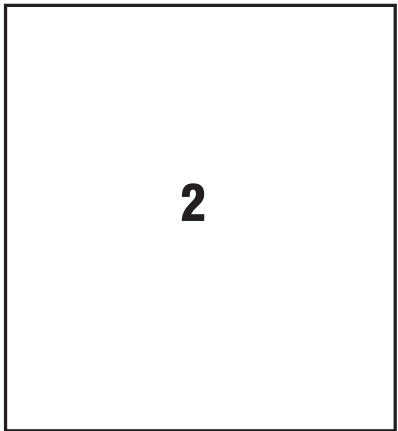
**The World Bridge Federation flag was flown at half-mast throughout the World Championships in Hammamet, Tunisia, in memory of Edgar Kaplan.**

of France, and his other assistants were Britons Mark Horton and Brian Senior.

Of major interest to all bridge players -- the movement aimed at making bridge an Olympic sport is progressing. There is a good chance that bridge will be a demonstration sport at the Asian Games in Bangkok next year. Mark Hodler, vice president of the International Olympic Committee, visited the tournament and offered optimistic views about bridge as an Olympic sport.

Former WBF President Jaime Ortiz-Patiño, now president emeritus, conducted a special service for the late Edgar Kaplan at which many friends of Kaplan offered special tributes to their long-time friend. WBF President José Damiani authorized the WBF flag to be displayed at halfmast throughout the tournament in recognition of Kaplan's tremendous contributions to the game.

The contract for the 1998 championships in Lille, France, was signed. A letter of intent to hold the Bermuda Bowl and Venice Cup in Bermuda in January 2000 also was signed. This will mark the 50th anniversary of the Bermuda Bowl, which was played for the first in 1950 -- and of course the site was Bermuda.

On some deals, declarer or defender is on the lookout for a certain card. That was the case on this deal from the first qualifying session of the Stratified Open Pairs, played by Barry Rigal and Beverly Perry.

When 4♠ is doubled, it is easy enough to predict that trumps are not going to split favorably. On the lead of the ♦K, it is necessary to play low from dummy and ruff instead of playing the ace so as to leave the ace as an entry to dummy and to start reducing trumps to the same length as West.

You lead the ♠A, and the sight of the ♠8 is a delicious one. Next comes the ♠Q. West wins and switches to the ♥4. Your second stroke of luck is that East is unable to read the position in hearts and wins the ace immediately instead of ducking. East returns the ♥J and you win the ♥Q, unblocking the ♥10 from your hand. You ruff another diamond and exit with the ♣K, which is ducked by West. Another club to dummy puts West on lead in this position:

I missed the best defense to 3♣ so I had to make up for it by trying to pull the wool over declarer's eyes. On a heart lead to the ace, I had to find the diamond shift to beat the contract legitimately. Instead I played a spade which declarer won, and he led a club to the jack. To created possible confusion for declarer, I dropped the ♣9, trying to look like a man with the doubleton 10-9.

It worked! Declarer crossed to hand with a top spade and led the ♠Q to the king and ace. Now declarer cashed the ♥Q and led a low diamond. I hopped up with the king, cashed the ♠10 and played a third spade. Declarer could ruff in dummy but was left with a diamond and heart still to lose. The following hand was equally interesting.

We had found our best fit, but the defense started off on the right track. A diamond to the king was followed by a low club. I won the king and led the ♥Q to the ace.

## 53rd wedding anniversary

Three years ago Simme and Jerry Frank traveled to the North American Championships to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary. They had such a good time that they came back again this year to play and celebrate their 53rd anniversary.



Back came a low club, and a third spade forced me to ruff. Now I cashed the ♠A-K to pitch dummy's last club, and the ♦Q went to the king. This was the ending:

But if North had discarded the ♦10 on the ♠Q, I can get only one out of the last three tricks. Try it and you'll see.

# How to Matchpoint

Many players new to duplicate bridge are puzzled about scores which come out with strange numbers that seem to have no relation to the trick scores and bonuses which show on a bridge scoring table.

These duplicate bridge scores are the result of "matchpoint" comparisons of the scores of the pairs which played identical hands. No doubt you are aware of this, but you may not understand exactly how it works.

For each pair that played in your direction that you outscore on a duplicate pair hand, you receive one matchpoint. You receive one-half a matchpoint for each pair you tie. You get nothing when a pair outscores you. The sum of your matchpoints for all hands determines your score for the game.

The high score for each hand is determined by the number of times it was in play. If the hand was played eight times, the high is seven because seven other pairs besides you played this hand. If it was played 13 times, the "top" is 12, etc.

For every pair that gets a "top" on a board, there is another that gets the corresponding "bottom". As a matter of fact, every North-South score has a reciprocal score on the East-West tally sheet.

Scoring a bridge game these days is ever so much easier than it used to be before computers. Usually the director can print out the final scores only a few minutes after he receives the last scoreslip.

# Bridge Maxims

Living with a bridge expert is more difficult than being one.

Slow play dictum: nice guys finish fast.

Rule 1: Partner is always wrong.

Rule 2: if by some quirk, partner happens to be right, refer to Rule 1.

There are three kinds of bridge players: the experts, the presumptuous experts and the majority.

"Is sloppy dummy play due to ignorance or apathy?"

"I don't know and I don't care."

Chinese proverb: "A gem cannot be polished without friction nor partner perfected without adversity."

'Tis well to remember when judging partner's expertise that she is judging you with the same smug, superior impartiality.

The road to hell is paved with good conventions.

There's more than one way to play every hand; that is, unless it's the hand you just played.

Delay criticizing partner for one complete round and the urge will die of starvation.

If you must go down, for heaven's sake, get on with it.

Get your zeros early. That way, you have more time to catch up.

Never insult an opponent until the round has been called.

If you haven't found the best line of play by trick 10, try divine guidance.

The player who can smile when things go wrong has just thought of the dumb bid his partner made.

Never try to teach a pig to play bridge. It wastes your time and annoys the pig.

When West opened 1♠, this frequently was passed around to South -- what should he do? I guess the best possible result is to pass it out.

An equally difficult problem occurs if East responds a forcing 1NT. Of course you are haunted by the idea that West might have psyched -- but can you do anything?

At our table the auction was equally bizarre. West passed (!) -- perhaps he mislaid an ace or two. Beverly Perry as South opened 2♣. Now West sprang to life with an intrepid 2♠ call, passed around to Beverly. She doubled.

West asked North, "What does the double show?" I answered that I was not sure but I thought it was for penalties. West and North passed, and East asked again, "What's the double?" I said that we had no agreement that it was for anything other than penalties.

East also passed after some thought, and I led a trump. Beverly won the king and led two top diamonds. West ruffed the second and exited with a low spade. I showed out and West turned to me and said, "You are right -- it is a penalty double!" Plus 500 was a near top -- not surprisingly.

The above is Barry's report. When your editor started asking people for Bulletin hands, one after another wanted to talk about Board 12. Here are some of the auctions and stories.

1♠ Pass Pass 4♣  
 This went down two undoubled. South was sure that West's opener was a psych.

Here's how Roy Green, our CEO, handled the deal.

1♠ Pass Pass Dbl  
 2♥ 3♣ Pass 3♦  
 Pass Pass 3♥ ?

Green had no problem here -- he doubled and set the contract one trick for one of the few North-South pluses on the board.

Here's what happened at Jo Morse's table:

1♠ Pass Pass Dbl  
 Pass 2♣ Pass 2♠  
 Pass 3♣ Pass 3NT  
 All Pass

The opening lead was a high heart. Declarer won the second round, cashed the two top spades and led the ♠J to knock out the queen. After cashing the hearts, Jo correctly led a club, and the defense collected four club tricks

to inflict a four-trick set.

Lots of Wests wound up in 3NT. Those that decided to make the best of a bad thing just cashed their seven tricks and accepted a fair number of matchpoints.

Zeke Jabbour managed to get to just 2NT, and when he drove out the ♠Q, West did NOT shift to a club -- plus 120.

Kathie Wei of course opened 1♠ as West -- and the opponents let her play it there -- down two.

Annette Barrett was one of those who jumped to 3NT in passout seat. Her story is unusual -- she went down two tricks without ever winning a second spade trick! She won the second heart and cashed one spade and four diamonds. She decided to see what would happen if she led a club -- East had signaled with the ♣9 on the spade trick. The defense got mixed up and she wound up with a club trick.

George Rosenkranz made the right decision as South -- he passed 1♠. He and Eddie Wold defended accurately and collected a 150-point penalty for a top.

No, that 1♥ bid is not a misprint. Russ Ekeblad and Ron Sukoneck play a canapé system whereby the first suit named often is not the longest suit. Ekeblad as East was pretty sure Sukoneck's bid was a canapé, considering his spade void, so he decided his best course of action was to pass -- he didn't want to hear his partner bid spades. From that point the North-South situation went from bad to worse to worst. Perhaps North redoubled out of exasperation -- we don't know -- but the final tally on the board was plus 1600 for East-West. □
