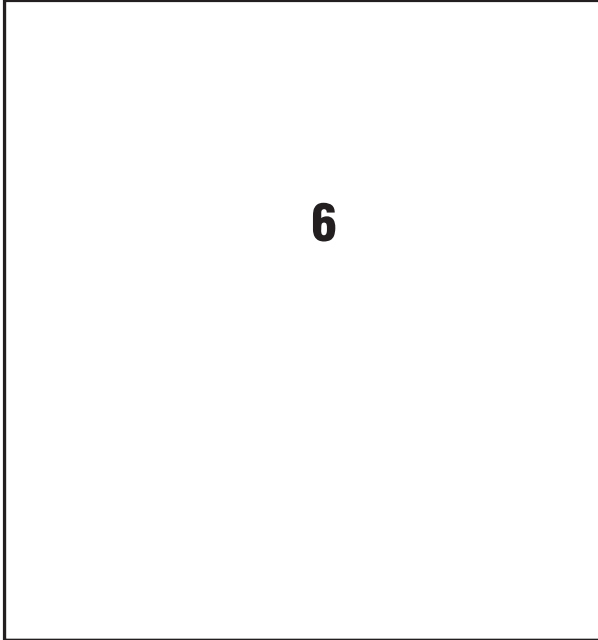

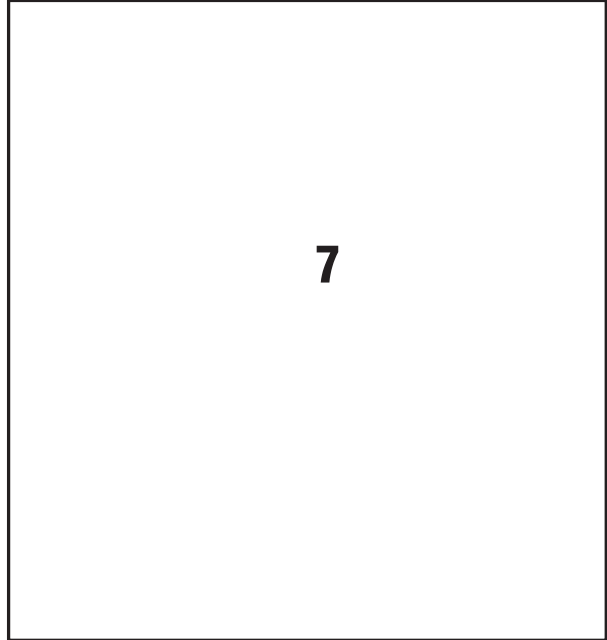

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## Ruth McConnell honored as Grande Dame of Bridge

Ruth McConnell was called the Grande Dame of North American bridge by Chairman Aileen Osofsky as Ruth was honored yesterday at the Goodwill Committee meeting. Ruth was called out of town and was not able to be present, but the proceedings were captured on video.

Ruth made history in 1974 when she became the ACBL's first woman president. In 1985 she became the first woman to be elected to the World Bridge Federation Executive Council. She served for several years as the treasurer of that organization.

Ruth also was one of the powers behind the start of the Venice Cup world competition. Carol Sanders, in 1974 a member of America's first Venice Cup team, called all Venice Cup players present to come

## Edgar Kaplan memorial

Many friends of the late Edgar Kaplan gathered yesterday for a memorial service. Various speakers quavered with emotion as they talked about their old friend. His long-time partner Norman Kay was not in town, so Judy Kay, his wife, spoke in his stead. Here's what she had to say:

*It is impossible for me to imagine a North American tournament not graced by Edgar's presence. He fought with every ounce of strength until the very end. And as his good friend Andy Arkin astutely observed at the memorial in New York, "He didn't give in, he didn't give up -- he simply gave out."*

*Sadly, Edgar's death has resulted in a double loss for the bridge community. Norman predictably has decided to retire from active bridge competition. I can think of no greater testimonial to this beautiful partnership that flourished with love and respect for nearly half a century. However, Edgar was always quick to point out that, despite their modest success, they undoubtedly held the record for losing more North American championships than any other twosome in history.*

*No one can refute the fact that Norman has been duly spoiled. Sitting across the table from Edgar was the quintessence of bridge fulfillment. He was every bridge player's dream partner.*

*But you must understand that it was not bridge that Norman loved -- more specifically it was "bridge with Edgar". For Edgar was endowed with a unique combination of enormous talent, superb judgment, good manners, impeccable ethics and a most adorable sense of humor. I think of him as the bridge world's droll silver-tongued orator!*

Following are excerpts from other speakers.

HOWARD PILTCH: Edgar always did the honorable thing. He never dealt in gamesmanship. There's no way to replace him in the international community. With Edgar, whatever was right for players was right for bridge.

RICHARD FREEMAN: I first played with Edgar way back in 1953, and I always had the greatest admiration for him. When we went to Beijing in 1995 for the Bermuda Bowl, it was absolutely automatic that Edgar would be our captain. All six of us agree that we wouldn't have won without Edgar. Edgar helped me personally in a great many ways.

GAIL GREENBERG: How lucky we are that Edgar chose to devote his incredible talent to bridge

instead of something else. He would have excelled at anything he tried. I was impressed by his humility -- he won 28 North American titles but he'd always point out how many more he lost. He also always had great respect for his close friends

BART BRAMLEY: I remember Edgar as a player. I never could beat Edgar. He had an aura at the table. I finally played in a Reisinger with him -- if you can't beat him, join him. He was magnificent last spring in the Swiss Teams, his last championship.

AMALYA KEARSE: Edgar had more effect on bridge players than anyone before or since. He also had a great effect on the world of bridge as a writer and as a creator and guru of the laws of the game. He was at home all over the world.

ALAN TRUSCOTT: I'm going to talk about the private faces of Edgar Kaplan. He was a practical joker. Once Peter Levintritt was moaning about all the work he had to do to get good hands ready for his classes. Edgar said there's nothing to it and showed a hand that was perfect. "And you can use the same hand to illustrate another point -- just transpose the North and East hands." Levintritt was astounded that Edgar could do this so easily. Edgar never did tell him that he had spent an hour and a half setting up this hand. Edgar was a historian, a chess enthusiast, a tennis player, a fan of Bach and Gilbert and Sullivan, a wine expert, a gourmet and a cat lover.

JOAN GERARD: Edgar was a part of my life since I started playing bridge in 1969. We must always remember what Edgar stood for.

RALPH COHEN: Edgar helped me to get to the United States so that I could go to work for the ACBL. I always looked forward to the first Saturday of each NABC -- that's when the Laws Commission met. I always loved to listen to Edgar talk about the Laws, and I'm honored to follow in his footsteps. Let's never forget that all of us here are Edgar's bridge family.

KATHIE WEI-SENDER: Edgar made the game pure and honest. My late husband C.C. Wei once asked Edgar why the United States always lost in the world championships. C.C. told him that the Italians had a better bidding system. C.C. decided he wanted to learn the Blue Club system, but Edgar touted him off of that and suggested that he work up his own system. As C.C. composed the Precision system, Edgar was his guiding light. I will not miss Edgar -- he's still here with us -- always.

## A neat little hand

Board 19 from the second qualifying session of the Board-a-Match Teams gave many top players a chance to analyze in search of a way to defeat 3NT.

This hand came to us from three different sources. One told us how well Judi Cody played it in the Women's Board-a-Match. Another explained George Mittelman's line of play. And Bart Bramley told us about Michael Rosenberg's successful line. All three were the same!

In each case South led the ♥K and continued with a second heart to the ace. Declarer then ran five diamonds, putting a tremendous discarding burden on South. South didn't want to sluff any hearts -- they were all good. Spade discards might help declarer in that suit. And a club discard might set up an endplay situation.

In all three cases South discarded a club and two spades. In each case the declarer read the situation -- they cashed the ♠A and put South in with a heart. South of course was able to cash the hearts but then had to lead away from the king-jack of clubs. 3NT making in each case.

Can declarer still make the hand if South keeps all three clubs? South can't pitch all three of his spades -- declarer could set up a spade trick on power with the 8 and 7.

What if South keeps one spade and sluffs a heart? Then declarer throws South in. South cashes three hearts but then must lead the ♠10. This is covered the jack and queen and won with the ace. Declarer then can lead the ♠8 to drive out the king, setting up the ♠7 as the game-going trick. A neat little hand.

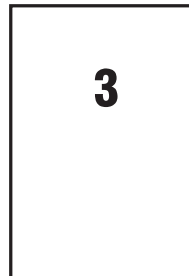
## Gene Simpson heads Educational Foundation

He has served on unit boards for the past 25 years, on the District 22 board for six years, on the Board of Governors for seven years and as Educational Foundation treasurer for two years.

## Building on a solid foundation

Sylvia Moss and Janice Seamon, winners of the Life Master Women's Pairs, had a strong last round to emerge victorious, but it was their steady play earlier in the event that put them in a position to win. These two deals from the event's second day illustrate that point. The first is from the first final session.

Seamon led the ♣5, not the best start for the defense, and declarer seemed to be in control when the ♠10 held in dummy.

North played a diamond to her ace and continued with a heart to the jack. Moss won the ♥Q and made the key play -- a diamond. Declarer won in hand and tried a heart to the 10. Moss won the queen and completed the defensive coup by returning a club.

Declarer's communications were now completely fouled. If she went to dummy with the ♦J to cash the ♥A, she would be stranded in dummy and actually go down on the forced play away from the ♠K. Declarer's only option was to cash out for nine tricks. Minus 400 was good for 21.5 out of 25 matchpoints.

Note that if Moss had returned a club at trick four instead of a diamond, declarer would have been able to win the diamond return in dummy and cash the ♥A before playing another diamond to hand.

The next deal is from the second final session and featured aggressive bidding by Seamon and Moss that paid off handsomely.

Not everyone would find a vulnerable, three-level bid with the North hand, but timid bidding doesn't win pairs events. Actually, North-South cannot be defeated in 5♥ thanks to the double fit and the favorable trump position. Norths who entered the auction on this deal reaped huge rewards.

Even if South leads a heart, giving up a trick, East can take no more than nine tricks. Moss avoided the heart lead against 5♠ and the partnership earned 17 out of 25 matchpoints for plus 300.

Incidentally, Seamon is a record holder in the Life Master Women's Pairs. At the 1993 Fall NABC in Seattle, Seamon and Sabine Zenkel (now Auken) won the event by the mid-boggling margin of seven boards.

## Brilliant defensive move

Kyle Larsen made a brilliant defensive move on this deal from the first final of the Life Master Open Pairs.

Larsen started with the ♥K to Zia's ace, Michael Polowan contributing a discouraging 7. Zia crossed to a high diamond and led a spade, putting up the king when Polowan played low. Larsen won the ace and returned the six of spades! This was a killer. Polowan won the queen and got back to Larsen with a heart to the queen. Larsen cashed his two good spades to set the contract one trick.

Of course Zia would never have played the hand this way in a team event, but he was playing matchpoints where overtricks are worth their weight in gold. If Polowan had the ♠A, Zia probably would have wound up with 11 tricks. If he had played the hand like a team hand, he would have knocked out the ♥Q and claimed 10 tricks.

It's a bit surprising that Zia went up with the king when Polowan followed low on the spade. If Polowan had the ace, he probably would have taken it and fired back a heart through Zia. Zia would have survived if he had played a medium spade instead of the king.

Sometimes it's a good idea to bluff. If your opponents believe that you have what you say you have, you can get away with murder.

If the opponents smell a rat, you had best let discretion be the better part of valor. Two East-West pairs on this deal from the afternoon session of the Stratified Mixed Pairs learned that lesson the hard way.

Perhaps East was confident of a spade lead. Perhaps East didn't see North's 3♥ bid card on the table. Perhaps East believes in the tooth fairy. At any rate, the defense was deadly accurate: heart to the king, spade to the jack, heart to the ace -- goodbye, ♥Q -- and so forth. The defenders took the first 11 tricks to rack up plus 700.

A top, you say? Not even close. Here's what happened when John Stansbury of Minneapolis and Adele Verkamp of Phoenix held the North-South cards.

East's pass was brave but the bluff didn't work. South found the heart lead, reasoning that it was correct because (1) the opponents had not looked for a heart fit and (2) her poor holding in the minors indicated the opponents might be able to run off nine or more tricks in the minors if her side didn't take their tricks first. The heart lead was very right, and the result was plus 2000 for North-South.

East should be forced to listen to the Kenny Rogers tune about knowing when to hold 'em and when to fold 'em. There's also something in there about knowing when to walk away and when to run. "Run" is the word East should memorize.

If you're going to duck a trick against an expert, be sure you do it perfectly in tempo. If you don't, you might end up like the defender who played against Hjoridis Eythorsdottir on this deal from the first qualifying session of the Women's Board-a-Match Teams. Eythorsdottir was playing with Linda Perlman.

South led a low spade and Eythorsdottir, known to friends as Disa, played low. North put in the 10 with just a hint of a flicker. It was enough for Eythorsdottir.

She played the ♠A and a low diamond to the queen and king, followed by three more rounds of diamonds. North discarded two low hearts and a low club. Next came a low club from dummy. When North followed low, Eythorsdottir flew with the king. Three rounds of hearts were next, leaving this position:

Eythorsdottir had only to exit with a club to North's ace to put the capper on a well-played deal and a win on the board.

East didn't want to lead a major -- South apparently had spades and North had hearts. Clubs didn't look particularly appealing, either, so she led the ♠8 to the jack and ace. Anglea led a club to the queen and played a spade to the 10 and jack. East led another diamond to partner's king, and West continued the suit to dummy's queen.

After cashing the ♥K and seeing the 10 drop from West, Anglea put on her thinking cap. East had only two diamonds, so apparently she was 4-4-2-3, in which case the ♥10 from West was a singleton. Suiting thought to action, she finessed the ♥9 successfully, then cashed the ace. She crossed to her hand with the ♠K, and when she then cashed her hearts she put unbearable pressure on East to protect the black suits. Plus 460 for a top score.

to the podium as she paid tribute to Ruth. Joining here were Jacqui Mitchell, Gail Greenberg, Dorothy Truscott and Kathie Wei-Sender.

Sanders recalled that the Venice Cup team presented Ruth with a rose for leading them to victory. Yesterday she showed the porcelain rose that will be presented to Ruth.

Glenn Smith, who succeeded Ruth as District 8's representative to the Board of Directors, told what a major difference Ruth has made in women's bridge. "Ruth contributed to bridge on all levels," he said. "Why do we say she was the first woman to do this and the first woman to do that? She just did things well -- she was great for her district."

Henry Francis read congratulatory messages to Ruth from former ACBL President Chris Wilson and original Venice Cupper Betty Ann Kennedy. He also told how instrumental Ruth was in advancing the Venice Cup to world championship rank.

"In 1978 she petitioned the WBF to change the Venice Cup into a real world championship," said Francis. "And she convinced WBF President Jaime Ortiz-Patiño she was right. Instead of being an exhibition match between Italy and the United States, the Venice Cup became a real international event with five teams from around the world competing."

"The Rosenblum Teams also began in 1978, but there was no woman's event to run alongside it. That was taken care of when a women's knockout was staged in Albuquerque in 1994. Who was this event named after? Ruth McConnell, of course!"

Barbara Nudelman read a congratulatory message from Tom Sanders.

Osofsky told of the new Zero Tolerance policy that will be put into effect at the Reno NABC next spring. "The plan should work," said Osofsky. "You take away their points and you're stabbing them in the heart."

Jay Brown was announced as the Goodwill Member of the Year (see story on page 1). Woody Kaiser, president of District 3, said the committee could not have made a better choice. He plans to pin the Goodwill emblem on Brown when he gets back to the West Coast.

Nancy Foy, ACBL's planning chief, was pinned as the newest honorary member of the Goodwill Committee. □

the big news. "I'm absolutely flapped. What a surprise!"

He stopped to catch his breath, then added, "I'm just me. I've been working with bridge players for 40 years -- always totally involved. I have a regular job, but I get bridge calls day and night, at work and at home."

"For me this is fun. I enjoy the game and I enjoy the people. I'm getting into my mellow time, and it's wonderful to have the contacts I have made in this game."

Jay has been interested in bridge for more years than he wishes us to know. Starting when he was six years old, he watched his dad play bridge every Friday evening. He found three friends to play bridge with when he was in the eighth grade, and by the time he was a senior the group had expanded to 12. When he went to UCLA, he was taught the rules and how to score by Lois Allard. As a matter of fact he was a tournament director for 25 years -- "but not any more," he said.

Nowadays, according to Susan Hurlbert who nominated him, "he contributes to the courteous, cheerful and ethical play of bridge. Our bridge club has been ranked among the leading clubs in the ACBL, and Jay is one of the main factors in our success and growth. He is always promoting goodwill at the table."

Here are more excerpts from Hurlbert's letter of nomination.

*We feel that Jay has made outstanding contributions to the ethical and courteous playing of bridge. He steps far beyond the requirements at our games, assisting players and ensuring a courteous environment. When Jay started directing at our club a few years ago, he took over a small junior game of eight or nine tables. Since then, the under-200 game has expanded to two nights of 17 or 18 tables per night. Jay now directs a number of our open games. These have become so popular that the club now offers valet parking because our large lot is so full.*

**The Facts:** 4♠ went down one, plus 100 for N/S. After the agreed-upon slow double of 3♥, South passed and West pulled to 3♠. After two more passes, South asked West about the double and was told it was penalty. East then quickly flashed his convention card to South indicating by pointing that the double was not penalty. South then bid 4♥ and after two passes, East doubled in tempo. West then bid 4♠. Because the 4♠ bid might have been made more attractive by the initial slow double of 3♥ and the improper actions involving his convention card the Director changed the contract to 4♥ doubled made five, plus 990 for N/S.

**The Appeal:** E/W appealed the Director's ruling. West and North attended the hearing. West stated that with six-card spade support and almost zero defensive strength, he was always going to pull the double. West agreed he had already shown no interest in defending by pulling the double of 3♥. When asked why he had not bid 4♠ immediately over 4♥ he stated that he was afraid he would be doubled and would go down too much.

**The Committee Decision:** The Committee decided that although the 4♠ bid had considerable bridge logic, West had already in effect shown his (evaluation of) his hand by his pull of 3♥ doubled. This, coupled with West's failure to bid 4♠ immediately over 4♥ and East's improper flashing of the convention card created a situation where the delayed bid could not be allowed. The Committee unanimously agreed to change the contract to 4♥ doubled made five, plus 990 for N/S. After discussion, the Committee decided to return the deposit because the appeal had merit.

In addition, West was told that the flashing of the convention card in the manner that East did was the equivalent of telling everyone at the table that partner had erred in his explanation -- a most improper action. West was told to inform his partner of this and that the Committee regretted not having the opportunity to explain this to him in person.

## Blue Ribbon Pairs: play starts today

Play in the Blue Ribbon Pairs, considered by many the premiere pair event on the ACBL calendar, begins today.

The event is played over three days and includes two qualifying sessions, two semifinal sessions and two final sessions.

Entry is restricted to winners and runners-up in regional championships -- plus high finishers in North American championships, members of current Grand National district championship teams, members of current official teams representing ACBL and the top 100 lifetime masterpoint holders.

The event is contested for the Cavendish Trophy, awarded for the National Open Pair Championship and donated by the Cavendish Club of New York in 1928. Since 1963, the trophy has been awarded to winners of the Blue Ribbon Pairs.

Dorothy Truscott and B. Jay Becker won the inaugural event in 1963 -- and Truscott remains the only woman winner.

Bob Hamman has four wins, each with a different partner: Lew Mathe in 1964, Ron Von der Porten in 1986, Nick Nickell in 1991 and Michael Rosenberg in 1993.

Larry Cohen also has four wins: with Ron Gerard in 1981, with Marty Bergen in 1983 and 1988 and with David Berkowitz in 1996. Cohen and Berkowitz were second last year.

Kit Woolsey has three wins: with Steve Robinson in 1973 and 1975 and with Ed Manfield in 1990.

In the 34-year history of the Blue Ribbon Pairs, there has been only one tie: in 1984, Jack Kennedy and Bobby Wolff tied with David Funk and Mark Lair.

Lair waited another 10 years before claiming his second title in 1994 with first-time partner Alexander Weiland.

## Al Rand

1907-1997

Al Rand of New York City, a major member of the bridge community, died Sunday evening just three weeks short of his 90th birthday. His family and friends had been planning to give him a party on his 90th birthday on Dec. 14.

A Gold Life Master with more than 4000 masterpoints, Rand won the Men's Swiss Teams North American championship in Buffalo. He lived in New York City for the last 60 years of his life. He married Rita Rand, another North American champion player, 34 years ago.

He was a brother-in-law to the late Sam Stayman, and they worked together in Strand Investments.

Rand had a major athletic background. While at Penn State, he played as both a halfback and a quarterback. Up until his late eighties he was still playing tennis regularly and he did hundreds of wall pushups daily.

Rand was one of the persons who was trapped in the elevator during the 1987 NABC in St. Louis. The elevator was quite crowded, and Rand was having a tough time. The elevator was in telephone contact with the hotel, and Rand's problem was called to the attention of the operator. She asked to speak to Rand.

She told him that she understood that he had a lot of experience handling people and that some of those on the elevator were having problems. She asked him to take charge and calm down his fellow passengers. He instantly forgot about his own problems and reassured his fellow passengers.

## Venice Cup champions honored

ACBL President Howard Pilch last night paid tribute to the American team that won the Venice Cup last month at the world championships in Hammamet, Tunisia.

"This was a major achievement on the part of these women," said Pilch. "It's time for champion women players to get the credit due them. In the past it has been the practice to downplay the winners of women's events. That time is past. These women are true champions. They survived an extremely gruelling competition, finally overcoming a powerful team of women from China.

"I take off my hat to congratulate Lisa Berkowitz, Marinesa Letizia, Jill Meyers, Mildred Breed, Tobi Sokolow and Randi Montin. Special kudos go to Sue Picus, their non-playing captain, who made all the right moves en route to the championship."

Pilch was right when he said gruelling. These women had to survive a full week of round-robin play -- three matches a day. Then came a 96-board quarterfinal, a 96-board semifinal against their compatriots from the United States and a 128-board final. Two full weeks of non-stop bridge.

As Voltaire said, "Revenge is a dish best eaten cold." When Doug Heron and I played Michael Seamon and Mike Passell in the second qualifying session of the Open Board-a-Match Teams, they were in a mood to try to get their own back for a defeat in the Morning Knockout Teams a couple of days before.

If I had put the ♠Q in I would have been laughing, but I played low and Passell scored his jack and played a second diamond. I won, cashed the ♣Q and finessed in hearts. Seamon won the ♥K, but instead of cashing the diamond he played a spade. I played the ace and Passell ruffed. I still had a spade and a diamond to lose. Down three! Next:

Alas, this is how it went: opening club lead to the ace, heart to the queen and king, club ruff and a heart to the ace. When I led the ♠Q, Seamon won and gave Passell another club ruff. I still had a heart to lose. Down three!

# Freedom of choice

There are times to get active on defense, and times to lay low and let declarer find his own pathway to doom. When you can see that, left to his own devices, declarer is going to find the right line, it is time to get busy and create some losing options for him.

Fred Gitelman of Toronto chose a good time to do this on the following deal from the second qualifying session of the Open Board-a-Match teams:

Playing Rusinow leads (second from touching honors), George Mittelman led the ♠10, which went to the queen and the king. Gitelman returned the ♠3, Mittelman unblocked the jack, and declarer won the ace. Crossing to the ♦A, declarer now played on clubs, and Fred took his ♣K on the second round.

The unfortunate position of the spade spots meant that Fred could not cash the ♠9 without setting up dummy's 6, and if he led a low spade to George's 8, he had no real hope of getting back in again. Meanwhile, the ♥J-4 looked like a death holding underneath a declarer who had bid the suit twice. The time had come to put declarer to the test: Fred tabled the ♦6.

With eight tricks in the bag, declarer now had to make a crucial choice. Had Gitelman underled the ♦Q? If so, declarer had to duck this trick to the jack. If Mittelman held the ♦Q, declarer's only hope would be to win the ♦K and take a successful heart finesse. If Fred had underled the ♦Q, why had he done it? Perhaps because he knew the ♥K was onside anyway? Suddenly, declarer had to try to decide exactly what the defenders were doing to him and take appropriate action.

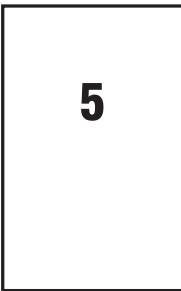
Try to put yourself in North's shoes -- what would you have done? Of course, with the luxury of seeing all four hands (a useful preamble for accurate dummy play), we would all have ducked the diamond, wouldn't we? Unaccountably, declarer at the table got it wrong, going two down when the heart finesse lost.

Of course, you knew that -- otherwise there would have been no story.

Pawliger, East, declared 4♥.

Upon winning the opening lead of the ♠Q with the ace, Pawliger immediately cashed two high diamonds. Noting the fall of the queen, declarer played a low diamond from dummy. North discarded a spade and declarer ruffed.

Pawliger now cashed the ♠Q, crossed to the ♠A, and called for the ♦J.

If North ruffed low, Pawliger could overruff, play two top trumps ending in the dummy, and discard two clubs on the good diamond and spade, making six.

If North ruffed with the jack, declarer would overruff with the ace and finesse South for the trump queen, again making six.

North actually decided to discard another spade, so Pawliger discarded a club loser.

He now took two top trumps, ending in dummy, cashed the ♠K, and called for dummy's remaining diamond. North could ruff if he wished, but Pawliger would simply discard his remaining club loser, yet another road to 12 tricks and lots of matchpoints.

**Locked out**

Peter Boyd made a perfectly simple play at trick two that effectively locked East out of a trick he expected to get. The deal occurred in the second qualifying session of the Open Board-a-Match Teams.

East was able to win the ace but was unable to continue the attack on diamonds. Effectively East's second diamond trick was locked out. Look at the difference if Boyd nonchalantly plays a low diamond. Eventually West will get in again with a club and lead a diamond through.

There are, of course, other considerations -- not the least of which is whether one is a better bet to make than the other. George Rosenkranz and Eddie Wold conducted an expert auction on this deal from the Open Board-a-Match Teams to find the top spot.
