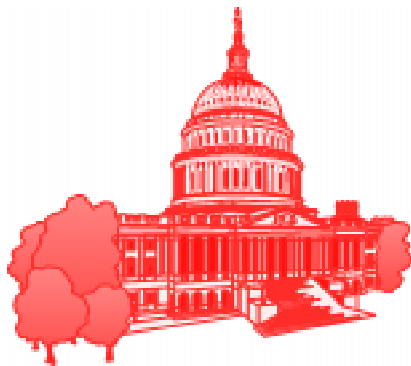

## Bjerkan victor in Wagar Women's KO

It was close all the way, but the team captained by Cheri Bjerkan gained a major swing four boards from the end to win the Wagar Women's Knockout Teams. Bjerkan (Stasha Cohen, Pam Wittes, Renee Mancuso, Beth Palmer, Lynn Deas) defeated Kent Massie, npc (Kathie Wei-Sender, Betty Ann Kennedy, Jill Levin, Sue Picus, Janice Seamon-Molson, Tobi Sokolow), 140-126.

Bjerkan had a 32-IMP lead at the halfway point, but Wei-Sender cut the margin to 13 in a strong third quarter. Wei-Sender actually led briefly in the final quarter, but the 13 IMPs Bjerkan earned on Board 61 settled the match.

Every member of the winning team but one has won at least one world championship. The sixth player, Mancuso, has come close – she has a world silver medal.

Actually the same is true of the losers. All but Seamon-Molson own gold medals, and Seamon-Molson has a silver.

The swing on the key hand came about because Deas decided to open a 10-point hand in first posi-

## Lo, Schwartz grab IMP Pairs crown

Ai-Tai Lo and Alan Schwartz each won their first NABC title yesterday by topping the 182-pair field in the final of the National IMP Pairs.

Lo, of Reston VA, and Schwartz, of Fairfax VA, posted a final score of 93.34 IMPs to edge out William Ehlers of West Orange NJ and District 25 ACBL Board member Richard DeMartino, of Riverside CT, who finished with 89.67.

In third with 80.30 IMPs were Deborah and Samuel Cohen of Lisle IL.

This is the first nationally-rated win for both Lo, a software engineer and Schwartz, a meteorologist. The IMP Pairs is a four-session event.

Ehlers and DeMartino were leading until the final round. DeMartino reported that they failed to defeat a tenuous 3NT contract on the final deal of the evening, which allowed Lo and Schwartz to take the lead.

The leaders scored well on this deal from the second final session:

## Bridge needs young people to thrive

The future of our game depends on developing a sustainable systematic way to bring youth into the game. Not just a few dozen here and there, but thousands upon thousands nationwide year after year.

Why? Ninety-six percent of our present members are over 45, and the demographics ensure that the situation will worsen for decades. Existing school programs led by volunteer teachers cannot begin to produce enough new players to offset these dramatic losses.

Research done by BridgeAtSchools indicates that a new school bridge model is needed to attract large numbers of school and to enable them to embrace and sustain a bridge program. The heart of the solution is a curriculum that can be taught by existing teachers who may not necessarily be bridge teachers. The need to leverage school personnel is paramount since more and more schools are limiting the use of non-school personnel and since there aren't enough bridge teachers in our membership base to meet the expected demand.

Another key component of the program features inter-school competitions at regular tournament sites. Such program often captivate and sustain youth interest.

We bridge players know that our game develops math, critical thing and social skills. However, school administrators and parents need stronger evidence before they will endorse it. As a bridge

community, we need to prove the educational value of bridge to create new demand for our product.

Once there is a demand for our product, corporate and government grants will provide additional resources to introduce it into more schools. To that, BridgeAtSchools is launching research pilot programs to measure the game's impact on a variety of educational outcomes. It is also developing an educational curriculum explicitly aligned to the national standards for math, critical thinking and social skills.

BridgeAtSchools does its own fund-raising and has been actively writing grants to private foundations and soliciting corporate support. However, these efforts may not come to fruition for some time. In order to continue this program which is well on its way to becoming the premier model for school bridge programs in North America, support from individuals is needed too.

With your donation, you will not only be ensuring that the game of bridge continues for generations to come but you will be solving one of our many societal problems by improving education, reinforcing youth's self-image and confidence, promoting social harmony.

When you think about what bridge has done for you personally and others that play the game, how can you not want the youth of North America to reap the benefits of this game we all love?

## Montreal world and regional information

The deadline for applying for entry in events at the 2002 World Bridge Championships in Montreal has passed, but on-site registration is possible.

The tournament is set for Aug. 16 to 31. Alongside the world championships, the 18-day Can-Am Regional will award World Bridge Federation masterpoints in some events for overall placement.

The registration deadline for the world championships was last month, but ACBL President George Retek said some on-site registration for major events will take place. He suggests contacting tournament chairman Tibor Bertalan for more information. Bertalan can be contacted at (514) 487-9552.

Pre-registration is not required for the regional, which begins Aug. 16 and ends Sept. 2.

The schedule of the world championships and travel-hotel information can be found in the May issue of *The Bridge Bulletin*, page 66. Information about the regional is on page 7 in the June issue. The tournament includes a full Intermediate/Newcomer schedule.

Both tournaments will feature valuable registra-

tion gifts and section-top prizes.

The world championships will feature a full schedule: Mixed Pairs, Zonal Mixed Pairs, Rosenblum (open) and McConnell (women's) teams, Open Pairs, Zonal Pairs, IMP Pairs, Senior Teams, Senior Pairs, Junior Pairs, Junior Teams and a Junior individual. Juniors in Junior world championship event play at no charge.

Air Canada, official airline of the world championships, is offering discounts for travel within North America. Quote convention code N CV 664436.

Contract: 6NT. Opening lead: ♠10. Plan the play. *Kantar's answer:* With nine tricks in the black suits plus the ♥A K for eleven, you need one more trick. You have two chances: (1) lead up to the ♦K, which is 50%, or (2) play the ♥J, and if covered, re-enter the dummy with a spade and lead a heart to the 9, a play which requires East to have both the ♥Q and the ♥10, approximately a 25% chance. Guess what you should do.

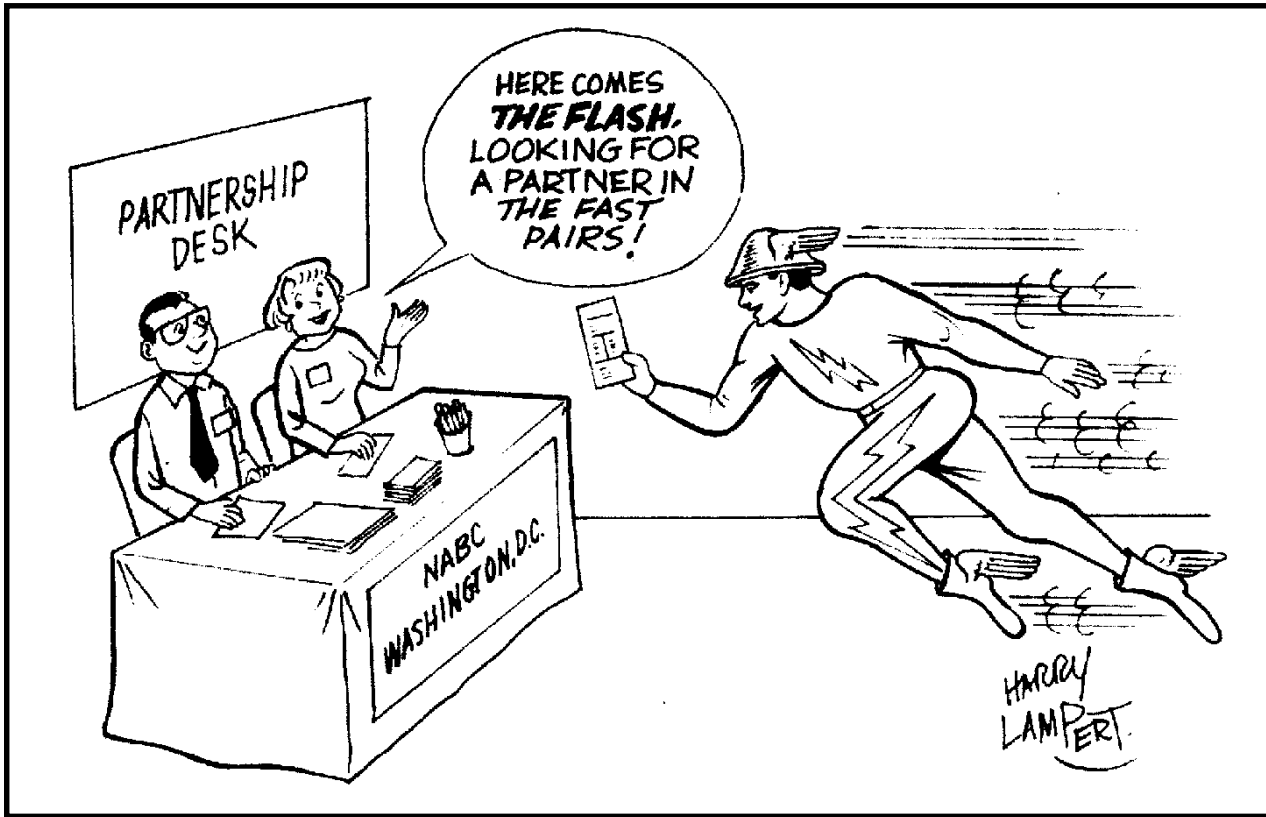

South led the ♣10 and Itabashi inserted the jack. He then made the key play of the ♠K from dummy. North won the ♠A and switched to a trump but Itabashi was in control.

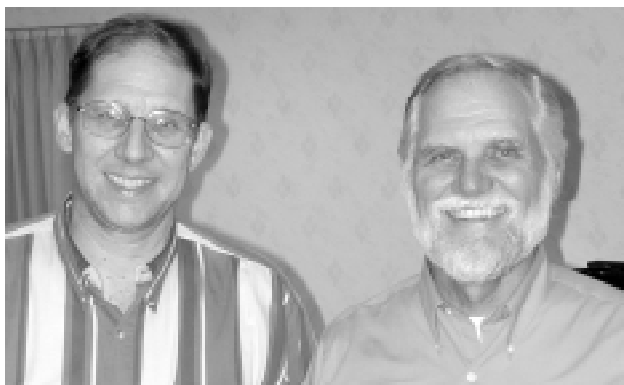
He won dummy's ♥5 and led a diamond, playing his king when North followed with the 9.

He ruffed a spade and led the ♣A, ruffed by North and overruffed by Itabashi. Another spade ruff established the suit. Itabashi played the ♣K, discarding a diamond when North ruffed.

North was helpless. He could cash the ♦A but that would set up dummy's queen. When North continued with a heart, Itabashi took the marked finesse, cashed the ♥A and played spades, giving up a diamond at the end for plus 590 and a cold top.

## Totally hoodwinked!

Once in a great while it's possible to be in a grand slam off a cashable ace and know there's an excellent chance the opponents won't cash it. Watch Roger Lord and Peggy Kaplan at work on this deal from a Round of 32 match in the Spingold. In a later match the Lord team eventually lost to the George Jacobs team in a very tight match where correctly guessing the location of a queen would have meant winning instead of losing. Lord's teammates were Hideki Tokano from Tokyo, Japan, and Todoshi Teramoto of Yokohama, Japan.

Opening lead: ♥2.

West knew partner held the ♥A and the ♦A. He also knew that if a spade was not led, he could sluff his spade on the ♦A.

North was certain his ♠A would be ruffed, and he did not want to risk setting up dummy's second spade honors. When North-South discovered that declarer held a losing spade, they assumed that East had misdescribed West's 4♠ bid, and they requested a ruling.

After investigating, the directors realized that West's bid actually did show a spade void, and West's intention was to hoodwink the opening leader. The table result stood, of course.

Kaplan pointed out that it was difficult to imagine a player whose team was leading by 30 IMPs risking an adverse swing. Lord, however, looked at the situation differently. Not only did he believe the swindle would be most likely to work — he also feared that the opponents at the other table might gamble a grand slam in order to recoup some IMPs.

The swing was 13 IMPs — the opponents stopped in a small slam at the other table.

## New Life Master

Joon Pakh of Berkeley CA needed only .01 of a point when he sat down in yesterday's Open Pairs event. He and Brad Mampe of Brighton MA earned a section award and Pakh became a Life Master.

## Adequate trump support

Have you ever bid a suit naturally and have dummy table eight-card support? It happened yesterday in the first final session of the National IMP Pairs.

This was doubled by North. Imagine everyone's disbelief and awe as they watched Bartusek put eight spades on the table as dummy.

This deal was played against Cindy and Bob Bernstein. Mel's 4♥ was natural and to play and a little imaginative. He managed to score the ♠A and a diamond ruff(!) to go down eight tricks or minus 400.

That was a valuable 11-IMP gain (their teammates were plus 980 in 6♥), but it wasn't enough.

## Semifinal slams in Wagar Knockouts

This slam deal is from the semifinal round of the Wagar Women's Knockouts. Sue Picus was North, Jill Levin South.

After Picus's aggressive 4♥ jump, Levin was always going to bid slam, but a 3♣ jump would have done the trick too.

In 6♣, Levin took a long time before playing to the trump lead. Then she played three rounds of clubs, ruffing with the 7, drew a second trump, ruffed a club with the 9 and exited with the ♦Q from hand. The defense could take this, but Levin could now simply ruff a heart in dummy to draw the last trump. This was a 13-IMP pickup since the opponents played game at the other table.

One room played in 6♦, down one when the ♦A appeared singleton onside.

In the other room, the auction was 1♣-2♦; 3♣-4♣ (Roman Key Card)-4NT (two plus the queen); 6♣.

6♣ is better than 6♦ mainly because they might take the ♦A to let you fall back on the spade finesse. Plus, some 4-1 splits give you extra chances. The actual diamond lie is the only one to make 6♣ a shoe-in and 6♦ no play!

He reached 5♣ and West slipped fractionally by leading the ♥A-K. Zia ruffed, and instead of relying on the double finesse in spades, he decided to strip the diamond suit just in case something happened. Did it ever!

On the second diamond West produced the queen, then Zia ruffed the third diamond high as West discarded. Since East was virtually marked with a 2-4-6-1 shape, Zia decided that the right play was to lead to the ♠Q, cash the ♠A and exit with a club. It worked. East had ♠J-x and a singleton club and was endplayed to concede the ruff and discard. This was worth a game swing in a Spingold match.

**Subject:** Misinformation

**Event:** Life Master Pairs, second qualifying session

**The facts:** 5♣ doubled went down three, +800 for N/S. After play concluded, 3♦ was explained as a mini-splinter with three-card support, but the N/S convention cards were not marked as such. East understood 4NT to show clubs and a red suit and still chose to bid 5♣. The director allowed the table result to stand.

**The appeal:** E/W appealed the director's ruling. When questioned about South's 3♦ bid, North said, "I know it is something, give me a minute." North then took a minute and said, "I think he has not many spades, lots of diamonds, and not many points." E/W believed that the misinformation led to their bad result. The committee examined the N/S convention card which was marked weak jump shifts to two-level only. South intended 3♦ as a mini-splinter which was not marked on the card, but was their agreement. East stated during questioning that she knew West had a red suit when he bid 4NT, but "he is the pro, I'm the client. I would rather he play a six-two fit than me play a four-four. I don't want to declare."

**The committee decision:** The committee decided that South had not misbid and that North had given misinformation. By East's own statement the misinformation did not lead directly to the bad result because East was never going to bid 5♦ or 5♥. Since East's statement severed the connection between the misinformation and the result, the committee allowed the table result to stand. The appeal was judged to have merit because of the misinformation. N/S were instructed to properly fill out their convention card.

Chazen was playing in a 5-2 fit instead of the 6-3 club fit, but you know how it is - you have to make do.

When he saw the opening lead of the ♥2, whistles and bells started going off in his head. He recognized immediately what was going on -- West was trying to reach partner to get a club ruff. He happily called for the ♥J which won the trick. But he was still far, far from home. He led a low spade to West's 10 and ruffed West's return of the ♥A. He led a club, and West of course resisted the temptation to ruff. Chazen called for the jack, and East went into thought for several minutes. He could see pluses and minuses for taking or refusing the trick. Finally he took his queen.

Back came a diamond to the ace. Chazen had to leave trumps alone, so he led another club. This time West ruffed and returned a diamond to Chazen's king.

It was all over. Chazen cashed the ♠A, dropping the king, then the ♠Q, dropping the jack. He overtook the ♣K with the ace and took the rest of the tricks, making an unlikely game in spades.

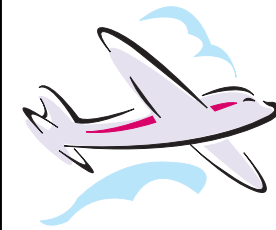
## NABCs now are true international events

## Mixed BAM Teams started back in 1929

The Mixed Board-a-Match Teams, one of the oldest ACBL events, begins play today.

The event, first played in 1929, is a four-session event with two qualifying and two final sessions.

At stake is the Lebhar Trophy, donated by Bertram Lebhar Jr. Lebhar earned a national reputation as a sportscaster and later as a bridge player and administrator. He won the Spingold in 1940 and the Master Mixed Teams in 1946.

Lebhar served as ACBL treasurer from 1945 until 1947 and was instrumental in ACBL modernization. He was named ACBL Honorary Member for 1963.

West played a low spade at trick three, East ruffed again and tried a low club. Dummy's ace won the trick. A club ruff to the closed hand was next, followed by a trump to the ace, and a trump to the queen picking up the last trump. Declarer now played the ♠J, taking the marked ruffing finesse against West. Schwartz later conceded a diamond to make exactly nine tricks for plus 140.
